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FORWARD/ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

This book includes an historical and architectural resource survey of the Village of Seneca Falls Historic District. This "Building-Structure Inventory Forms" survey is more informally known as the *Blue Forms Survey*. Because the boundaries of the Historic District are identical to those established by the Women's Rights National Historical Park, and the New York State Urban Cultural Park, the historic resources these deem of lasting value are included and documented as well.

The inception, preparation and production of these Blue Forms has spanned nearly ten years, and has involved a broad cast of characters I can only hope to recapture and properly acknowledge. The major players, as can be seen from the title page, were the New York Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, especially its Historic Preservation Bureau, for whom most of the Blue Forms were prepared as a major requirement for including the Village of Seneca Falls as one of 14 parks in the statewide Urban Cultural Parks system. The Office and Bureau staff have also provided ongoing staff support and information.

The National Park Service, notably the Women's Rights National Historical Park located in the Village, has supported and encouraged the production of these Blue Forms with ample financial and in-kind resources from the onset of this complex project to its conclusion.

The National Endowment for the Arts; the Village Board of Trustees; the Village Planning Department (especially in its formation as the Whole Duck Catalogue under the direction of Bert Fortner); the Preservation Planning Workshop, College of Architecture, Art and Planning, Cornell University; the Seneca Falls Historic District Commission; the Village of Seneca Falls Downtown Revitalization Committee, and the Urban Cultural Parks Advisory Committee, both under the direction of August Sinicropi; the Seneca Falls Historical Society; and the

A BRIEF HISTORY OF SENECA FALLS¹

The Village of Seneca Falls is fortunate in that much of its nearly two-hundred year history is well recorded and accessible. Therefore, this synopsis is not inclusive, but rather an overview to stimulate your interest in further reading. The bibliography lists additional historical resources, many which are publications of the Seneca Falls Historical Society, and thus easily obtained. In addition to the impressive historical resources of the Society, and of the Women's Rights National Historical Park, the National Endowment for the Arts has sponsored three other historic projects in addition to this Blue Form publication: a walking tour of the Village of Seneca Falls; a booklet on the design history of the Village: and a before-and-after video of the Historic District, each with an emphasis on 19th-century homes and buildings. All these materials amply document the history of Seneca Falls.

In brief, the Village of Seneca Falls was settled in the 1790's. By the mid-1800's the Village was incorporated and had become a thriving manufacturing town, which fully showed the many changes brought by the Industrial Revolution in the first half of the 19th century. The Village was founded along the falls of the Seneca River, a mile-long series of rapids with a combined drop of approximately 40 feet. A private company controlled access to the water power that the falls represented, and this Bayard Company's inflated prices prevented development of new industry until 1825. That year the company went bankrupt and its interests were sold. This allowed others access to water power, and the rapid growth of mills and factories along the river banks, and what was known as "the Flats," quickly followed. Within six years there were five saw mills, two textile factories, five flour mills and three tin and sheetiron plants. In the 18-year period between 1824 and 1842, the population of Seneca Falls increased from 200 to 4,000!

Thus, in less than one generation, all of the changes associated with the Industrial Revolution were evident in Seneca Falls.

Seneca Falls' location at the hub of several important transportation arteries also played a major role in its growth and development. In 1794, the trail of the American Indian moving West became the Great Western Turnpike, a portion of which was the main street of Seneca Falls. Seneca Falls was linked to the Erie Canal system by 1828; the railroad crossed Seneca Falls in 1841.

A major fire swept downtown Seneca Falls in 1890. Most of the structures on Fall Street were either destroyed or substantially damaged. Rebuilding occurred quickly and most of the present buildings on Fall Street date from this period. In 1915 substantial improvements by the State of New York to the New York State Barge Canal to accommodate large boats resulted in flooding the Flats. The Flats had developed as the focus of Seneca Falls industry; many homes in this area were moved to other sections of the Village, where they still exist, others were demolished.

Today, industry continues to provide the economic base for Seneca Falls. The primary products are metal pumps and knitwear. The Village itself is a retail and commercial center for much of Seneca County. At the heart of the Finger Lakes region, Seneca Falls is a popular tourist and vacation area, especially visitors to the Women's Rights National Historical Park, the National Women's Hall of Fame, and the New York State Urban Cultural Park, all located within the Village. Seneca Falls is located at the north end of Lake Cayuga, the largest of the seven Finger Lakes; its present population is approximately 7,000.

SENECA FALLS HISTORIC DISTRICT²

The Seneca Falls Historic District, also known as the Human Heritage District, was formed in 1980 to protect the

many historically significant physical buildings and sites in the Village. People come and go over time, but our 19th and early 20th-century architecture is irreplaceable. It was with this flux in mind, that the Historic District boundaries were established.

Despite many losses, the Village of Seneca Falls is fortunate to have retained a large number of architecturally and historically significant buildings. Some of these structures have local or national historic value because of their original occupants, or because they possess notable architectural features. The home of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, for example, stands as a reminder of a prominent Village resident who was instrumental in initiating a national movement for women's rights. The high-style homes of once-prominent businessmen and community leaders remind one of an era of growth and prosperity. The modest homes built by many of the working-class immigrants recall the pride and struggles of life in the new world.

Individually, these structures may not have as large an impact on our perception of the past as they do collectively. In fact, the majority are not sufficiently outstanding to merit special recognition in themselves. The outward appearances and exterior relationships of groups of buildings, structures and sites, however, define commercial and residential neighborhoods whose whole is greater than their parts. Summarized below are the rationale and criteria for the District boundaries:

ARCHITECTURAL

- 1. High-style architectural styles, as well as simple styles, were included. For descriptions and photographs of these various styles, see Historic District Commission, Guidelines & Standards for the Protection and Enhancement of the Seneca Falls Historic District, 1986.
- 2. Judgments of architectural worth were based on New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation standards. The District boundaries include a goodly number of what are known as pivotal and matrix sites, mixed with a large number of "filler" sites. There are also

scattered numbers of compatible and incompatible, non-historic structures.³

PEOPLE

- 1. Homes of historic figures and captains of industry: Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Washington Street; Judge Gary Sackett, West Bayard Street; Edward Mynderse, Cayuga Street, etc.
- 2. Neighborhoods associated with the workingclass of early Seneca Falls: Washington, Seneca, Troup, and Latham Streets, where workingclass Irish immigrants lived, influencing Elizabeth Cady Stanton, an organizer of the first Women's Rights Convention in Seneca Falls, July 1848.

COMMERCIAL

- 1. Sackett District, the Village's first and still active commercial district.
- 2. Central Business District, including parts of Fall and State Streets.

INDUSTRIAL

- 1. Actual sites of industries that developed in Seneca Falls: Canal Street, Water Street, and Seneca Street, and formerly "the Flats".
- 2. Neighborhoods developed to house factory workers: Bridge, Clinton, Johnston, Latham, Mynderse, Prospect, Seneca, Washington Streets.

TRANSPORTATION

- 1. Great Western Turnpike: Fall and Seneca Streets.
- 2. Seneca River: part of the New York State Barge Canal System.
 - 3. Stage Coach Route: Bayard Street.

4. Streets that once led into the Flats: Fall, Seneca, Prospect, Troup, Latham.

The boundaries of the District were determined by a careful survey of existing buildings and areas within the Village. Buildings, structures, sites and other features display a sense of historic cohesiveness in scale, material, texture and craftsmanship. The District not only contains a variety of structures possessing high-quality styling and workmanship, but represents a sense of time and place that continues to serve as a foundation for growth and change in the Village.

Protection and preservation of such historically important areas are ensured by local zoning ordinances. These ordinances contain regulations aimed at preventing the use of incompatible materials and methods of construction that detract from the aesthetic and historical values of the District. These regulations apply to exterior architectural features that are publicly visible, and are aimed at preventing demolition, new construction, renovation or remodeling not in keeping with the established character of the District. Following is a map, and a list of streets in the Seneca Falls District, indicated by house number.



Pivotal (historic), an intact building which has special visual merit or historical experience; Matrix (historic), a vernacular building which retains an authentic appearance; Filler (historic), an old building which has had unsuitable alterations or siding added; Incompatible (non-historic), a building which detracts from the historic environment; and Compatible (non-historic), a recent building which does not detract. These types of buildings are also related to a State color-code, which is discussed later.

The purpose of the Historic District, as described in the

Code of the Village of Seneca Falls, is "to promote the educational, cultural, economic and general welfare of the public." In order to accomplish this, the Historic District must continue to be "protected, enhanced, perpetuated and preserved." It is a matter of public purpose that:

(1) the Historic District's distinctive and historical character not be injuriously affected;

(2) the value to the community of those buildings of architectural and historical worth not be impaired and;

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(3) the Historic District be maintained and preserved for education, pleasure and welfare.

The Historic District may potentially provide many benefits to the community. The most obvious is the preservation of local heritage — the cultural, historical and architectural symbols of the past. In addition, the District tends to stabilize or improve property values by stimulating the upgrading and maintenance of structures and the environment. Individual effort and investment in preserving historic properties also will be protected from unwarranted actions, inappropriate construction, or renovation by those unaware of the historical value of their properties. The Historic District strengthens the local economy by generating tourist interest and travel, and provides educational and aesthetic benefits to both local residents and visitors.

SURVEY METHODS

This historical and architectural Blue Form Survey of the Historic District of the Village of Seneca Falls was undertaken to identify the historically important buildings, structures, and sites within the District. The emphasis in this survey was placed on the existing environment — what remains — rather than on interpreting or recapitulating what had been lost. It was felt that identification of such resources was the first and essential step toward preserving and protecting these sites and structures for the future. There are, however, some data on what has been lost. The Blue Form Survey consists of the following:

Blue Forms on approximately 500 buildings within the local Historic District. These forms generally provide the following information on each building:

- A. Present owner and address
- B. Current photograph(s)
- C. Location map
- D. Construction date and builder and/or architect

- E. The alterations the structure has gone through over time
- F. The surroundings of the building
- G. Architectural description/assessment
- H. Historical information

A visual survey of the Historic District resulted in a color-coded map of the District with five colors indicating each building's relative significance. The color code was created by the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation for statewide use in similar surveys. The code's purpose is to enable state officials, planners and others to identify concentrations of architecturally and historically significant structures, as well as important individual buildings. Generally, the application of the code is based on the architectural merits of a building and the extent to which its exterior has been altered. Red signifies a building of major importance with few alterations. Green indicates an older building, not of exceptional significance, with very few exterior changes. Yellow denotes an older building which has been altered so as to significantly affect its historic character. Blue indicates that a structure is incompatible with the surrounding historic environment by virtue of its scale, materials or character. Brown represents a recent building compatible with its historic environment. Brown may also represent high-quality contemporary design.

The Village of Seneca Falls Planning Department has the following materials on hand, as well as the original plans, worksheets, and background information on this entire project:

- 1. A map with all properties in the Historic District coded according to the State's color code for architectural integrity. An overlay showing property lines and the proposed National Register District.
- 2. A map of the entire village with each property color coded, according to the State's code.
- 3. A description of each of four proposed National Register Districts, with photographs, which con-

stitutes a second phase of the Blue Form Survey.4

4. Color slides describing these four National Register Districts, with a location map.

The benefits of this Blue Form Survey are as follows:

- 1. Architecturally and historically important buildings and areas in the Village have been identified.
- 2. The Historic District has been well documented, with detailed information on each building, allowing more informed planning and design, while also increasing historical information about the inception of the Women's Rights movement.
- 3. Village residents, especially Historic District residents, now have a cohesive source of information on their buildings.

These Blue Forms constitute the bulk of this book. The sources used for each survey are noted under Section #21 on each form, in addition to those listed in the Bibliography at the end of this book. Finally, a wealth of information — facts, leads, insights — was obtained from area citizens and leaders, many of whom are oral historians of some note.

Plans are presently underway to prepare nominations for National Register recognition for the Central Business District and adjacent streets.

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



Main entryway features fluted major and minor pilasters with two-paned frosted sidelights and two-paned toplights (now infilled). Modern replacement door features half-round wheel-light and raised molded panels. This house enjoyed a much more commanding site before the D.O.T. project of 1980-1983 raised Ovid and Bayard Streets several feet

Bascom and his family, especially Mary, Ansel's daughter, were close friends of Elizabeth Cady Stanton and her family who lived half a mile away. Bascom aided Stanton in the renovation of her house on Washington Street when she came to Seneca Falls in 1846 (Eighty Years, pp. 144-5.) In politics, Bascom was elected to the first President (Mayor) of Seneca Falls and during his long political career, he was associated with a wide range of reform movements, including abolition - he was a founding member of the anti-slavery Free-Soil Party - temperance, women's rights, and most importantly, legal reform. At the meeting of the New York State Constitutional Convention in 1846 and the State legislature in 1847. Bascom was instrumental in overturning some of the documentary laws restring married women from holding property in their own home (Grip's, pp. 81-82). Bascom fully participated in the reforms of the age: from the personal reform of diet advocated by Sylvester Graham, to the broad political questions of the age.

On July 10, 1857, Bascom sold the house and lot which extended to the Episcopal Church on the east (now Westcott Rule warehouse) to Erastus S. Roberts. Roberts was a native of Seneca Falls (b. 1818) who having reached his majority traveled via Panama to California as one of the original "49ers" searching for gold. Roberts, after seven years of prospecting, returned to Seneca Falls in 1856 and joined the textile firm of Southwell and Roberts which later was to become Roberts and Briggs. Their will established for itself an outstanding reputation in the region. Roberts also was a trustee of the Seneca Falls Savings Bank and with his wife Sarah Markel Roberts a devoted member of the Presbyterian Church (Portrait, p. 495.)

In 1896 Mrs. T. Cowing resided here. Mrs. Cowing was a member of the family that controlled a company which produced metal products, most importantly pumps, and which occupied two of the three other homes which remain (1985) on the block of Bayard between Bridge and Spring St. In the early 20th c. the house was occupied by William Malone. Malone owned the coal and lumber yard which became Ferrara and Sons at 28-30 W. Bayard (1985). Apparently during the period of the Cowing occupancy the shape of the lot changed considerably, including the sale of the parcel at the immedate Ovid/Bayard corner for a grocery store.

Peter Doran purchased the structure in 1940 to house the undertaking business he had begun in 1923.

In the 20th c. the most important force shaping the house's immediate context has been road projects. The grocery store went in the interest of road widening. In the early 1980s the State of New York carried out another highway construction project which substantially raised the grade of the two adjoining streets, changing the structure from one which sat high above the street to one only a few feet above grade.



rear. The 1881 Sanborn map confirms that the structure still had an open porch and a rear extension. By 1886, another 2 story extension was added on to the east end of the south side of the structure. This basic configuration remained the same for quite some time until the current owners had them removed around 1975. At that time, a new roof was put on and the interior was gutted. The middle, second story rectangular window has been infilled with brick to accommodate a smaller square window. The front door, the aluminum storm windows, and the open porch which wraps around the southeast corner of the building have all been added.

Two sons, Philo and George, joined the business as partners in 1859. The three men carried on until 1875 when financial reverses swept away the greater part of their property forcing John Cowing to retire from active business. He died several years later on May 13, 1879, and left two daughters, Janet and Elizabeth, who lived for many years down the street at 24 East Bayard Street, where the Super Duper now stands.

Edward Bayard was one of the house's most prominent occupants. Edward Bayard was born in Wilmington, Delaware on March 6, 1806. He studied law in Canandaigus and then came to Seneca Falls. He was married to Elizabeth Cady Stanton's sister.

The house at what had been 24 East Bayard Street was known as the Crownshield House. It was built in 1829 for attorney Daniel Forman by contractor John Stevenson. Members of the Crowninshield family, a distinguished family of statesmen, were the house's most prominent occupants. Another important family in the history of Seneca Falls was also connected with this house. From mid-1880's to around 1920, Miss Elizabeth Cowing and Miss Janet Cowing lived at 24 East Bayard Street. It was their father, John P. Cowing, who had begun one of the earliest pump and fire engine manufactories in Seneca Falls.







The property on which this house sits was once part of the Bayard Land Company holdings. The earliest mention found of this particular piece of property was when in June of 1878, Augusta G. Miller, wife of Josiah, purchased it at a sheriff's sale for \$174.28. Although the price was so low, the house was depicted on the 1873 bird's eye view as well as the 1882 bird's eye view. The 1896 Miller map showed that Augusta Miller was the owner of the house. However, it is known that she did not live there herself but rather that she rented out the house for a number of years to various employees of the pump companies. Finally, Edward DeWall purchased the house in 1949; it has remained in the family since that time.

Augusta Miller was the wife of Josiah, a prominent member of the Seneca Falls communities. She was the daughter of William King whose family was origi-







of her natural life. Carrie Smith's husband, Sidney (born in 1852), was a mail carrier in Seneca Falls for many years. The 1896 Miller map confirms that the Smith family was living at 36 East Bayard Street.

Upon the death of Carrie Smith, the property was sold to Elbert Smith Coffin by the Seneca County Trust, executor of Carrie Smith's estate, for \$3000. On September 5, 1942, the property was sold to Victor and Arthur Baldassari; on January 8, 1944, it was sold to Ruth Whipple; and on August 2, 1972, it was sold to Santo and Phyllis Altimeri for \$100 with the stipulation that Ruth Whipple could live in the house for the duration of her natural life.



#### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The property originally belonged to the Bayard Land Comapny and was first shown on the 1883 Mumford Property map. The lands were initially purchased from O.S. Latham by Alfred Goodman. The first mention of Alfred Goodman as a resident of this house appeared in the 1874/75 Seneca Falls Business Directory. He was listed as being a merchant tailor who sold clothing, hats, caps, and gentlement's furnishings at his store at 77 Fall Street. He remained at the house until arouri 1888 when he moved to Ovid Street.

The 1896 Miller map snows that William Riegal was residing at this house.. This is confirmed by the 1894/95 directory which shows that William Riegal was the owner of the house. He was born in 1840 and his wife's name was Mahala.

20. William Riegal was a farmer and dealer in horses, wagons, hay and straw. He owned 7 horses and 2 cows which were probably kept in the stable which used to be located to the north of the house.

Another prominent family associated with the house was that of John O'Brien, owner of the Coal and Wood Yard located at East Canal Street and Lock Street at one time. John O'Brien had moved to Seneca Falls in 1887 and was employed delivering groceries for the next four years because his health required that he be outdoors. In 1891, O'Brien leased a small coal yard. The business was immediately successful and grew enough that he had to expand his facilities in 1894.

The main entrance to the commercial addition had a pair of plate glass swinging doors located diagonally between front (N) and side (W) facaded. Plate glass windows were located in the commercial addition. Windows in the original building were infilled on the first floor and a section of plate glass window from the commercial addition extended into it. Windows on the second floor are 2/2 double-hung. The "telescoping"  $1-\frac{1}{2}$  story, wood frame, gable roof, addition appears on an 1896 map. The windows in the brick structure are jack arches and there is a plain frieze with prominent cornice returns at the gable ends. This structure has a stone foundation and an asphalt shingle roof. In the early 1980's, the commercial renovations were removed and much of the original architectural appearance of the building restored.





He was also a member of the Knights of Columbus. He died on May 14, 1966, and the house was sold by his estate to Charles Brown sold the house in 1970 to Charles and Margaret Freligh. Mary Anne Nichols acquired the house in 1975 and currently resides there.



1782) also lived with them.(3)

Stephan Viele was a lawyer and quite prosperous. The 1829 tax assessment credits Viele with two lots worth \$200 and a total worth of \$600. By 1850, his net worth was \$8000, and he owned seven houses in the village worth \$3750 (4). About him, fellow lawyer Gilbert Wilcoxen later wrote, "S. S. Viele was a short, fat, red-faced man of few words, who wore gold-bowed spectacles at the end of his pug nose, a man of few words, who had an exhalted idea of the dignity of the profession... He was a man of more than ordinary ability."(5)

In 1831 Viele was a founding member of Trinity Episcopal Church, and signed the incorporation paper for the group.(6) He also served the community by acting as village prosecuting attorney in 1837. When the <u>Seneca Falls Democrat</u>, a newspaper was established in 1839, Yiele was a member of its business committee.(7)

Viele continued to practice law in Seneca Falls until his death in 1862.



This house, and the now-deceased "Latham twin houses" (demolished in 1985) were owned during the 1840s and 1850s by members of the Latham Family. The Lathams were involved in the construction industry, and in partnership with Judge Gary Sackett, they built many of the homes in the Sackett District. The surviving home, largest of the three, at 37 West Bayard Street, was owned by Mrs. Lovina Latham, who lived there with her daughter Hanna, both of whom signed the 1848 women's rights Declaration of Sentiments.








Canal Street.(5) But both men jointly owned the house until April 1873 when Roberts sold his interest to Johnson,(6). However, both men continued to live there; Johnson at 42 West Bayard Street and Roberts at 40 West Bayard Street.(7).

Johnson (b. 1822) shared his part with his wife Amanda (b. 1829), and with his brother Edward (b. 1829) a butcher, and Horace Roberts (b. 1832) also a butcher. Roberts (b. 1825) shared his half with his wife Sarah (b. 1828), and his brothers Henry (b. 1827) and Jiles (b. 1831), who were butchers.(8)

By 1894, Johnson had retired, and died in 1899 at the age of 77.(9) Roberts worked as an ice dealer and continued to live at 40 West Bayard Street.



The rear 2-story Italianate addition projects past the plane of the main building wall and is asphalt sided, but retains prominent wooden corner boards at the bay windows. The bracketed cornice ties in to the main building at the second floor window cap level. A hipped roof wooden porch at the intersection of the main building and the addition covers the rear entry into the main building.


Stephen Gay is mostly remembered for his work in establishing the churches of Seneca Falls. In January 1829, he was instrumental in establishing the first Methodist Episcopal Church of Seneca Falls, and was one of the founding trustees. However, he was not a member of the church. When Trinity Episcopal Church was organized the following year, Stephen Gay left the Methodist group and was elected one of the first vestrymen.

No other information about Stephen B. Gay survives. It is likely that the Gay family, which remained prominent in Seneca Falls for many years, is descended from Stephen Gay.

The building has a high (approximately 4 feet above grade) stone foundation with portions of the original stone watertable on the front.

At the time (1940's?) that a wooden, shed roofed addition was built out to the sidewalk line on the main facade, a steel I-beam was installed running the width of the building at approximately one foot below the top of the first floor windows and door, and the brick and stone work below this removed to grade. In 1983, the addition was removed, cinderblock installed to the top of the foundation level, a concrete watertable poured to match that remaining on the old walls, and the brick work rebuilt to match the existing.

An additional entry door was cut at grade into the east side gable old wall, but both gable ends retain their well-proportioned eliptical lights.

There is a one story, wood frame, shed roof addition at the rear, extending the full width of the building.

builder. About 1837, he decided to buy the old oil mill and begin manufacturing sash and blinds. His first partner was Walter Jones; later John S. Gay was associated with them. Jones died in 1845 and Powell continued the business alone. However, fire and water had so damaged his building that he sold it to John P. Cowing and built a new one. At that time, he entered into partnership with George Milk. Milk sold out his interest after a few years, and Powell continued to conduct the business alone. His wife, Anna, operated a millinery shop in their home.

In 1855, Powell's failing health forced him to retire. By that time, his first wife, Anna, had died, and he had remarried Mrs. Levande Barrett in September 1872. From his first marriage, Powell had five children: Amelia (b. 1836), Charles (b. 1838), William (b. 1841), Henry (b. 1846), and Edward. Powell and his family had been long-time members of the Baptist Church and he had served as an officer in the Sunday School as early as 1838. He was also involved in the Seneca Falls Republican Club in the 1860's.

Powell died at 80 years of age in his house on Bayard Street in 1887.





### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Soon after deciding which partner got which land, Tillman sold land for the Franklin House to Jacob Young (August 27, 1828; see deed at Liber U. Page 141). Tillman appears to have been more than a land speculator, playing some role in construction as well (see historical sketch of Geneva, in 1862 directory.)

Throughout the structure's existence it has retained a set of core uses, focusing on eating and drinking. Peripheral uses have changed over time. The building has always had a residential use, housing boarders in the 19th century, and a more stable set of occupants in the 20th century (For 19th century, see 1862 directory, listing several individuals boarding at the Franklin House. For the 20th century, directories show a smaller number of occupants, usually the owner and one or two other individuals.). Late in the 19th century, the building also served as a train station. as the Village terminus for the trolley to Cayuga Lake (Fisher, Trollies,

Today the building is referred to as the Franklin Hotel, rather than the Franklin House.

The front porch is reached by wide central stairs that are flanked by newel posts, from which run square millwork railings that continue around the porch. There is a lattice apron under the porch.

His father was a prominent builder, both in Seneca Falls and in New York state, and his mother was a signer of the Declaration of Sentiments at the first Women's Rights Convention held in Seneca Falls in 1848.
Oliver Latham was born in 1816, and educated in Seneca Falls. He married his first wife, Lucy (b. 1821) as a young man, and by 1850 they had four children: Lucy (b. 1841), Gertrude (b. 1843), Margaret (b. 1846), and Jessie (b. 1850). of the property during construction. This is supported by the changes shown in the Sanborn maps between 1881 and 1886, which indicate that the left wing was enlarged. It is said that DeMott salvaged, cleaned, and reused the bricks from the original structure in his alterations.

Today the building has a shallow gabled roof perpendicular to the street on the main portion. The east wing is an unusual one bay wide, it's ridge running parallel to the street. The moulded fascia overhangs unusually far revealing a decorated soffit, and paneled freize. The body is stretcher bond brick. The windows have six over six double hung wood sash and large, Italianate window caps featuring compound moldings. The main entry is within the ell and features rope molding and round arched sidelights (now partially infilled). The secondary entry into the eastern façade of the main block also features rope molding without sidelights. There is a projecting four-course brick watertable with arches over basement windows. The foundation is courses of rubble of roughly squared limestone. The porch roof is circa 1920, the bluestone landing being contemporary with the roof. There is a recent one bay wood frame addition to the rear.

Rights convention, held in Seneca Falls in 1848, Chamberlain was not only a supporter of equality for women, but also an ardent supporter of the antislavery cause. Chamberlain headed up the local effort to organize the Free Soil Party in 1848, served as a member of the State Legislature and then in the House of Representatives in the 1860's.

Two years after his participation in the 1848 Women's Rights convention, Chamberlain sold the house on Bayard Street to Jacob Gamber (Liber 56, Page 36, 10 June 1850). Chamberlain moved to a house he built on lower Fall Street, apparently near Trinity Episcopal Church, a house since demolished. A little more than a year after his purchase, Gamber sold the property to Moses Rumsey (Liber 42, Page 437, 1 November 1851).

Rumsey, whose name appears on the 1856 cadastral map associated with the house, was a member of a family associated with the rise of iron products in the Seneca Falls economy. The Rumsey family owned the Rumsey Company, manufacturers of pumps, fire engines and cast iron products. The company dissolved as a result of bankruptcy proceedings soon after World War II.

Houses along West Bayard Street lost their claim on the village's elite as the 19th century wore on. Chamberlain bought the house for \$1,000 and sold it for \$700. Moses Rumsey bought it for \$500. Cayuga Street became the neighborhood of choice and the value of West Bayard Street houses fell closer to the median value. The residents of West Bayard Street became more and more from lower middle and working class backgrounds, like the residents of streets to the south had historically been.

In the 20th century, the building was home to at least two generations of the Lacey family. Mary, a member of the second generation, was a long-time teacher at nearby St. Patrick's school.

enlisted in the 8th NY Cavalry at the age of 16; however, the war ended before he had seen any hazardous duty. When he returned to Seneca Falls from military service, he went to work with his father, and the firm became George W. Davis and Son. They worked together until 1870, when George W. Davis moved to Jacksonville, Florida for the remaining twenty-five years of his life, devoting a great deal of his time to his agricultural interests. For example, he was in charge of the Florida's horticultural exhibit at the 1885 New Orleans' World Fair.

While a resident of Seneca Falls, Davis was active in politics, and the social life of the village. He was elected to the Board of Supervisors, served as police chief and president of the village for two terms, and was an organizer of the annual Seneca County Agricultural Fair.



A c. 1982 portico covers the entrance. Extensive additions within the ell junction houses an enclosed porch and garage. The building has an asphalt roof and the foundation has been stucced over.

### 20. HISTORICAL AND OTHER ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The earliest known owner of this lot is Lewis B. Baldy, who bought it from Judge Gary Sackett in 1853. (deed 53-111). Baldy most likely built the house. In August 1856, he sold it to Jacob Shoemaker, who was at that time a produce dealer and forwarder. (He later became a partner in a prosperous flour-milking company, Shoemaker, Daniels & Co.).

Shoemaker almost immediately sold the house to Jacob Smith, a blacksmith, who lived in the house about four years. In 1860, he sold it to Moses Rumsey. The house remained in the Rumsey family for many years, but the house was sold in 1893 to Dorliske Bailey to pay off debts. Bailey owned the house until 1902, when she sold it to Catherine Reardon. When Reardon died in 1965, the house was willed to Margaret C. Reardon. The same year, Margaret Reardon sold the house to Samuel and Lucy DiNatali. They, in turn, sold it to Thomas and Anna DiNatali, the present owners.



family to Aurelius, NY and worked at farming. Nothing is known of her up-bringing there, but by 1828, she had accrued enough money to buy the lot on Bayard Street. She may have actually moved to Seneca Falls in 1832 when her father did.

Matilda Sackett never married and shared the house with her unmarried siblings, Jonathan (b. 1792) and Amanda (b. 1803), and their mother Parthenia (b. 1777). Matilda and Amanda apparently did not work, but Jonathan was a prosperous paper manufacturer. He bought an interest in a paper mill which had been built in 1872 by entrepeneur Chauncy Marshall and subsequently owned by several others. When Sackett bought the mill, it employed 16 people and made a variety of grades and types of paper. Sackett decided to manufacture early straw wrapping paper. Unfortunately, the entire building burnt down in 1853.

Johnathan Sackett died in 1867. Matilda Sackett sold the house in March 1873, and lived until 1877. Where she lived the last four years of her life is unknown.

Bayard Street at \$750, and the house and shop next door at 71 West Bayard Street was assessed for \$800.

George Hocknell was a prominnent member of the Republican Party, and served as a village trustee and as Street Commissioner. He was responsible for laying much of the flagstone paving in the village. He was also latered remembered as one of the prominent men who congregated in Charles Hoskin's store, and made it one of the social centers in the village. In 1837, Hocknell was appointed a fireman in Engine Company #2, and was later made responsible for procuring necessary equipment, and for making sure it was properly maintained.

Although Hocknell is listed as a silversmith in the 1862 Yillage Directory, by 1867 he was working as an assistant assessor for the Internal RevenueService. Sometime after 1867, Hocknell left Seneca Falls and moved to Nebraska. He died there in May 1884.

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



Haas was the owner of the Empire Mills and Distillery Company, which was located at the corner of Water and Bridge Streets. The company had been started in 1830, and had 4 owners before Haas. He aquired it about 1856 from J.S. Gray. It is not clear why, but Haas committed suicide two years later.(3)


His widow Elizabeth, kept the house and continued to live there even after she remarried to the Reverend William Rees, a baptist minister. Together they raised Daniel Haas' three young daughters.(4) They sold the house in 1869, to Levanda Barrett, widow of Elias Barrett and later the wife of Winchester R. Powell.(5)







Soon thereafter, in 1926, he began work on this building, which he intended to be "the model convent of the diocese." It was to be a home for the Sisters of St. Joseph. The land on which the building stands was purchased for \$2000.00, across Swaby Street from the school. The building was designed by Rhoda Hogan, who also built it, at a cost of \$38,000.00

Father Quirk was also responsible for the construction of the present church building. The ground was broken for that structure in 1929, and the church dedicated in 1931.

The two cast iron dogs in front of the building were given to the sisters of the convent by the owners of a building on Seneca Falls' "Terrace Row".

Turrill. owned a sawmill in partnership with Benjamin Watson; it was valued at \$600 in 1829.(3) In 1834, the two partners opened a cloth fulling mill on Water Street. (4) It is not clear what happened to the business, but his house was sold in a mortgage foreclosure in 1841. Watson's house, which was next door, was similarly disposed of. Unlike Watson, Turrill did not disappear from the historical record, although he apparently moved out of the village: he does not appear on the 1850 census. In 1851, he is taxed for a house on Clinton Street worth \$400 and in partnership with J.L. Beebe for 2 lots and a house on Bayard Street worth \$800.(5) His agent was Ebenezer Insals of Seneca Falls.



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



"Nat" Latham was a self-educated architect and civil engineer, and worked with his brother Obadial on a variety of construction projects. These two, in conjunction with their brothers William and Edward built the Seneca Knitting Mills, the Seneca Falls Rule and Block Factory, the Seneca County Poorhouse, canal locks, Miller's damn, and the old Ovid Street Bridge. They also contracted for many projects in other parts of the state (3)

Nathaniel Latham served the community by acting as street commissioner for many years, and was superintendent of the canal from Waterloo to Montezuma (4). He and his family were members of the Trinity Episcopal Church (5).

He was remembered in 1936 in the following way: "He was short and heavily built, had a long white beard and a red face like the pictures usually accepted as representing Santa Claus. His voice was loud and his accent stentorian in character and volume."(6) Nathaniel Latham was also years ahead of his time in knowledge of the application of steam and water power to industry. In his old age, he conceived a rather eccentric plan of transferring water power from Niagara Falls all over the state by means of gears and drive shafts, but from a man who did not know anything about transference of electricity, it was the only way he could conceive of to move power (7)

Latham died in 1892, leaving the house to his wife Maria. She in turn left it to their daughter Ellen Poland in 1900, and she sold it to Owen Doohan that year.



The Gothic-arhoed double-door main entrance fatures numerous symbolic carvings including a statue representing St. Patrick. The church has a varicolored tile roof and a limestone foundation.

Rectory: The  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story, 6x3 bay rectory has an eaves-front gable varicolored tile roof over a rectangular plan with closed eaves. There is an interior stone chimney. The windows are a multi-light operable metal casement type with dressed sandstone lintels and sills. The: main body of the structure is faced with rusticated sandstone of variegated colors.

The main (north) façade includes a left-side entrance and a large right-side gabled pavilion. The main entrance is recessed behind a Gothic arch of dressed sandstone with label surround. The pavilion's gable features a carved plaque near its apex and is surmounted by a dressed sandstone cross. At the rear of the church and connecting to the rectory is an enclosed passageway, again, faced with rusticated sandstone of variegated colorings. The full-length windows are Gothic-arched and trimmed in dressed sandstone.

In 1848, a new red brick church was built on Bayard Street. An addition was made in 1865. This church was razed and a new one built on the site in 1929.



Sackett came to Seneca Falls in 1814 to open, with Luther Stevens, the village's first law office. Their partnership lasted until the mid-1820's, when Sackett became a Judge of the County Court of Common Pleas. In 1829 he served as Supervisor of the Town of Seneca Falls. After building his house, his economic activity focused on his farm, eventually some 600 acres, the largest in the community.

Sackett was associated with many early community organizations: he was one of the original members of Trinity Episcopal Church, founded in 1831, an original Trustee of Seneca Falls Academy, the first secondary school at about the same time. He donated a lot for the building of a Catholic parish church in 1835. (Grips, pp. 56, 47, 112)

After his death c. 1869 the house remained in the family until 1938. After two individual owners, the house was sold to the local Knights of Columbus Council in 1948, in whose hands it has remained since.

Boarding houses, like this one, played an important role in the rapid industrialization and economic expansion occurring in Seneca Falls and much of the Northeastern United States. For the first and second generation of factory workers, the boarding house system helped to ease the transition from farm to factory or from immigrant to citizen by providing a home-like environment.

During the 1930's the ground floor housed a bar and restaurant.

Sackett sold this building to Marvin and William Gaylord for \$1250.00 in August 1836. (deed F2-263). Sometime before 1851, they sold their grocery store to Samuel Hendricks, who continued to operate it. A variety of owners subsequently operated grocery stores in this building, until 1892, when it was vacant for a while.

In the 20th century, the building has periodically been vacant. Among the occupants have been: Owen Maguire's grocery store (c. 1902), Mrs. Nellie Brachen's embroidery shop (c. 1921-30), Cyrus Lovelace's Second-hand store (c. 1942), John's Barber Shop (c. 1954), Joe's Radio & TV repair (c. 1961), and the Styling Beauty Salon (c. 1970). ## 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

There Gary Sackett attended school, and studied law. In 1812, at the age of 21, he was admitted to the bar and began a practice in Cayuga, New York. That same year, he married Nancy Terrius Vance. Shortly thereafter, Sackett moved across Cayuga Lake to Bridgeport, New York, just east of Seneca Falls.

In 1814, Sackett moved into Seneca Falls, and opened Seneca Falls' first law office, in partnership with Luther F. Stevens By 1823, both Stevens and Sackett had been appointed judges (Sackett on the court of common pleas), and the partnership was dissolved. After 1823, Sackett devoted himself to the development of Seneca Falls. He was instrumental in the construction of the Seneca Lock Navigation Company's first canal in Seneca Falls, and in other schemes to wrest control of the village's water power resources from the monopolistic Bayard Company. In 1825, Sackett built a distillery, a grist mill and an oil well, on the north bank of the Seneca River. Shortly therefeter, he sold the properties so as to have the needed capital to take advantage of a tremendous investment opportunity.

That opportunity arose in 1828, when the Bayard Company's bankruptcy forced them to sell all their land along the river and canal. Sackett, Andrew Tillman, and Ansel Bascom joined to buy 600 acres of land, mostly on the undeveloped south side of the river, and all accompanying waterpower rights. The three men had the land surveyed and mapped, and divided the acreage into three parts. Each began to sell off commercial and residential lots at inexpensive prices, so as to encourage people to settle and start businesses on the south side. (All development was on the north side, along the route of the Seneca Turnpike). Sackett and the others believed that with judicious investment, Seneca Falls' natural advantages would produce tremendous growth and prosperity.

Sackett took the initiative in these investments. In 1828-29, he built this block of six brick stores, in an attempt to create a commerical district to rival Fall Street. These buildings were considered, "the finest row of buildings in the village; and being occupied as stores the principal part of the mercantile business of the place centered in that locality." The sophisticated, urban style of the buildings, and the fact that they were brick rather than frame structures, indicates Sackett's optimistic belief that Seneca Falls would become one of the major cities in the east coast.

Sackett's ploy was successful. The residential area near the Sackett block was heavily developed in the late 1820's and the 1830's. The south side businesses outsold the Fall Street ones all through the 1830's. Local newspaper advertisements fanned the competition; "Hooray for the south side," began many an ad. However, in 1841, the Auburn and Rochester railroad opened its road on the north side of the river. The location of the passenger and freight stations on the north side enabled that part of town to regain and keep the economic upper hand.

Although the central business district of the community moved back to the north side in the 1840's, this building and its neighbors continued to be utilized as businesses with residences above. They still serve these functions today.

Sackett sold this building to Lewis B. Baldy in July of 1852 for \$800.00. (deed 53-111). Baldy sold it to Archibald T. Johnson some time between 1856-62; Johnson ran it as a grocery. The Johnsons owned the building into the 1870's, but some time c. 1880, the building became a butcher shop. It remained a butcher shop until about the run of the century, when it became a "notions" shop. By 1911, it had become a furniture store.

The shop has also housed William Lacey's Barber Shop (c. 1920-30), John Gravina's Barber Shop (c. 1935-75), Fran's Beauty Shop, and more recently Encino Corp.

## 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

The second story windows are segmentally arched and include wooden sills, brick voussoir lintels, and two over two double hung wooden sash.

In March 1836, Sackett sold this building to George B. Daniels for \$1200.00. (Deed F2-83) Daniels had considerable land holdings and bought this property to generate rental income. No record of his renters has been found. He sold the property to Whiting Race, sometime before 1851. Race sold the store to Jeremial Trant c. 1856; Trant operated a grocery there until the late 1870's.

Subsequently, the building has housed a saloon (c. 1886), a bottling works (c. 1892), a saloon (c. 1911), Brenner's second-hand store (c. 1921), Augustus Cologgi's confectionery shop (c. 1929-42), Leo's Variety Shop from 1950 to 1980s; and more recently a flea market shop.

This structure is a two-story Federal style brick commercial rowhouse, the brick being laid in an unusual irregular common bond. Being a corner building, the shallow gable roof is parallel with both streets, resulting in a hipped corner. The stepped parapet sidewalls are somewhat deteriorated. time tenants were Van Buskirk and Larzelere who ran a grocery store.

By 1851, Smith and Henry's store at 23 had been sold to H.A. Palmer, who remained in the shop until about 1870. That year, John Rogar, bought the building and began operating a grocery there. His business remained at this location until about 1892, when the building was converted into a saloon and pool room run by John McKeon.


23 Bridge Street remained a saloon until about 1921, when John Bellardino turned it back into a store. Shortly thereafter (c. 1925), Anthony Vacca bought the building and rented it to Frank DeRosa for use as a restaurant. By 1939, Vacca owned both 21 and 23 Bridge and ran a confectioner's shop at 21 and a restaurant at 23 (Peter and Franks).

The two businesses remained side by side until about 1955. That year, Vacca's store disappeared, while Peter and Franks took up the extra space at 21 Bayard. 21-23 Bayard remained Peter and Franks restaurant until the late 1970's, when it became Antonina's restaurant.

18. Originally water-powered, the Greek Revival styled, 3½ story, 10 X 2 bay, structure is constructed of ashlar limestone. This wing is probably contemporary with the cinderblock additions to the entries and loading areas added to main facade of the main block. Other cinderblock additions fill in and connect several shiplap and clapboard sided wood frame buildings east of the main block that were independent originally.

Also, east of main block is a  $2 \times 3$  bay, 2 story wood frame, gable roof house now aluminum sided and converted for office use(possibly moved to this site).

20. and changes of ownership. Production reached a peak in 1862 when 200,000 pound of wool were being consumed annually for the production of "plain and fancy men's wear" for markets throughout New York State and the northeast. In that year as well, the Seneca Knitting Mill, its 100 in-factory workers and 3,000 to 4,000 women working outside the factory, turned out 8,000 pairs of socks a day in fulfillment of a contract with the U.S. Government and the Union Army. Under the subsequent ownership of Abel Downs and Albert Jewett (1864-1890), the mill continued to prosper.

Under Harrison Chamberlain's management, beginning in 1890, the mill was modernized and the newest technology introduced. By 1905, as many as 175 were employed. However, the tremendous outlays of capital over-extended Chamberlain's resources and the mill was liquidated. In 1972, the mill came to life once again when the Seneca Knitting Co. (founded in 1921 by Caleb Smith) relocated into the vacant building. That concern, now owned by Souhan's children, has thrived in its adopted historic site and thus maintains the Seneca Knitting Mills' place among the small number of early nineteenth century mills which are still functioning in their original role.



- 17. Savings Bank in the late 1970s made the area south of the Church on the north side of Cayuga St. one of totally commercial uses. The area to the north is an area of residences and park space.
- 18. The second story sanctuary is reached by way of symmetrical processions of stairs and landings starting in the base of each tower. The sanctuary is voluminous and features white stuccoed walls contrasting with dark wood trim. The ceiling is of wood, tongue and grooved with exposed trusses hanging below. One of the windows is of Tiffany stained glass.
- 20. After the Civil War an ambitious man, one Dr. Krum, came to serve as minister. He noted that the Presbyterian Church was no longer the largest in town (The Methodists, Baptists, Wesleyan Methodists, and Presbyterians all built churches within three years of each other.) He also realized that it was the growth of the education program which warranted construction of a new church in the past, and instructed the Superintendent of Education in the congregation to increase enrollment. And then Dr. Krum convinced the membership of the need for a larger church.

The work commenced in the summer of 1871. Archimedes Russell, an architect from Syracuse, NY, was commissioned to prepare the plans for the church. After much careful study and attention, the resulting building was judged "one of the most complete and elegant structures for divine worship that exists in central New York. It is a lasting monument to Christian zeal and devotion, though accomplished only by much sacrifice and the exercise of unbounded faith."

Rev. Ruel Taylor of Auburn, a contractor of large experience, received the contract. After the old building was removed, work commenced immediately on the new building, with the laying of the cornerstone of September 12, 1871. The structure was designed in the Modern English or Victorian period of Gothic architecture, the exterior being executed with pressed bricks laid in plumb bond and abundantly decorated with Ohio sandstone, furnished by the McDermotts of Cleveland, Ohio.

The front presents a Gothic gable with corbeled coping and beam tracery corresponding to the interior roof work. In the tympanum of the gable is an elegant rose window thirteen feet in diameter and filled with intricate tracery. The auditorium is 57 by 84 feet, 24 feet high at the sides, the whole being coursed with an open timber Gothic roof finished with ash. The basement includes Sunday School rooms and kitchen. "The exterior dimensions are as follows: length, 117 ft., width, 63. ft., width of front, across the towers, 78 feet. At the first corner [southeast] rises the main tower to the height of 166 feet. Starting from the ground with massive buttresses which terminate near the belfry and are capped at intervals with stone offsets and moulded belts and pointed windows between in the various sections, the whole terminates in a majestic spire. On the opposite corner is a similar small tower rising to the height of 96 feet. In the

20 (continued) belfry is hung one of Meneely and Kimberly's Troy bells weighing 3,500 pounds. Between the two towers are the three large windows resting on a heavy stone belt course and enclosed in a triple pointed arch with elegant stone capitals and arches; above these windows is a solid ornamental belting course and in the tympanum of the gable, a beautiful rose window twelve feet in diameter encircled with stone mouldings. The gable is crowned by a simple cornice and is surmoundted with an ornamental passion cross and beam travery in the apex [the cross has since been removed].

"The sides are of the same style as the front and are divided into six panels each with massive buttresses richly dressed with capitals and arches; the windows are filled with cusped travery and crowned with stone arches. The slating was done by the Norcott Brothers of Seneca Falls, in uniform black slate .... The interior consists of two divisions, a basement and a superstructure. The entrances are of solid white oak and are placed in the two towers which are approached by ample stone steps and open upon a landing midway in altitude between the two floors; from these landings in either tower the basement stairs descend and the main stairs ascend to the auditorium."²

The congregegation acquired a large two manual organ from the W. W. Kimball Co. of Chicago with 46 stops, 1,908 pipes and placed in a case of quartered oak and mahogany. The children of Mr. and Mrs. Seabury S. Gould, Mr. Gould having been the founder of the Gould Manufacturing Co., later Goulds Pumps, and who lived across Cayuga St from the church, placed a memorial window representing the Resurrection in memory of their parents. It is a good example of the work of a prominent manufacturer of stained glass, J. and R. Lamb of New York City.

In July of 1923 the National Women's Party held its annual conference in the Presbyterian Church. Three items were on the agenda for the conference. The first was the commemoration of the 75th anniversary of the first women's rights convention, also held in Seneca Falls. The celebration also included public viewing of articles owned by the organizers of that first convention, a 500 member, white dressed all-girls' parade, bunting of white, purple, and gold decorating most of the public and private buildings and a 600 car caravan to Susan B. Anthony's grave in Rochester. The second item on the agenda was a review of the past year's information gathered about continuing legal discrimination and also areas where discrimination had decreased. Most important, though, was the drafting of a Constitutional amendment guaranteeing the equality of the sexes. Herein lies the birth of the campaign for an Equal Rights Amendment to the constitution.

In 1966, a church hall known as Eastman Hall was created in the rear of the church lot out of a storage building. It serves as a function and meeting facility, as well as a day care center.

The architect. Archimedes Russell, designer of the church, was a 19th century regional architect whose building have enhanced the

20 (continued) landscape of Central New York for more than a century. Born in 1840 in Andover, Massachusetts, his father apprenticed him to a sign painter from 1853 through 1855. He also worked as a carpenter for his father. Russell's architectural career began in 1860 when he started working for John Stevens, a Boston builder-architect. Because of a lull in commissions duringthe Civil War. Rusell lost his job with Stevens in 1862 and came to Syracuse, where he found employment in the active office of Horatio Nelson White with whom he remained until he set up his own practice in 1868. Before his death in 1915, Russell's office received more than 800 commissions. In addition to his busy practice, Russell found time from 1873 to 1881 to be an unpaid professor of architecture at Syracuse University, the third American University to offer formal architectural education. Archimedes Russell was a regional architect, the majority of his work was in Syracuse, though he did do work in some sixty central New York communities spread through thirteen counties. Some of his more notable commissions include McGraw Hall (1869) and West Sibley Hall (1870) at Cornell University, Ithaca, NY, Also the Otsego County Courthouse (1880) at Cooperstown, NY, and Crouse Memorial College (1887-89) at Syracuse University, Syracuse, NY. Also Syracuse University, Russell designed the Von Ranke Library Building (Administration Building) (1887).

Russell's design was not a structural success. Within a few years of its completion, the north and south walls showed signs of spreading, a state of affairs blamed in part on the use of materials from the former church building. Two local contractors and self-trained civil engineers, Obadiah Jr., and Nathaniel Latham took on the task of setting things right. Their solution was iron rods running the width of the building which would have bolts at either end. In the tightening of the bolts, they hoped, the walls would become level. Obadiah set Nathaniel inside to supervise the tightening from within. When it was over, Nathaniel emerged, congratulated his brother and asked what would have happened had the procedure not been a success. Cursing was what came from Naţhaniel's mouth when informed that he very well would have been dead.

In the early 1980s the congregation renovated the church interior, installing a large cross over the altar, rearranging the altar and changing the orientation of the side pews.







# 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

According to the owner, this is one of the oldest standing Seneca Falls buildings. Alterations have made verification difficult. It undoubtedly preceded its neighbors, possibly as the first Swaby house. While the other houses of probably similar scale built in the earliest days of the village were demolished to make way for grander homes in subsequent waves of wealth, this house has survived.

There is record of this house being owned by Mrs. Z.D. Avery in 1896. Mrs. Avery was a daughter of Jacob P. Chamberlain, whose brother built the large Second Empire house at 30 Cayuga Street. The Knapps owned it, according to Mr. Moio, before Mr. Sheninberger did, from whom eventually Mr. Moio bought the house in 1951.



His business interest were many, including the manufacture of pumps, trussers and supports, and Pails, though he is well-known for his founding of the National Yeast Company in 1870. That company succumbed to advancing technology in the form of a yeast that was easier to use. The Yeast Company was located in the structure at the corner of Fall and Rumsey Streets, a structure that has been used since at least the 1950's as an automobile dealership.

Seymour's son, Henry W., also attended the 1848 convention.

After Seymour's death the house became his daughter Maria V. Seymour's property. She continued to live in the house for at least twenty years.

The house achieved its present form between 1911 and 1925. It is also within this time space that the local Grange took over membership. In the late-1980s, the Grange sold the building to Raquel Estorga.






View from Cayuga Street (Northwest)

The first floor windows are generally elongated to floor level, one over one double hung wood sash with interior shutters, smooth slightly segmentally arched limestone lintels with rock faced spring blocks and keystones, and limestone lug sills. The water table is smooth limestone, while the foundation is of massive, rock-faced limestone block.

The front porch wraps to the bay window on the south, a three-sided, shallow hipped roof projection with modillions below a projecting cornice with molding fascia. The windows are round-headed one over one double hung wood sash, divided by paired pilasters resting on a molded base, with smooth limestone water table and foundation. The porch has seven bays with a shallow hipped roof, projecting cornice with molded facia and major and minor brackets, and modillions. The architrave is decorated with interesting drop ornaments. The front entry is flanked by large brackets incorporating a large five-pointed star. The chamfered square posts are capped by molded cornices and rest on molded bases, between which run sawn board balusters, above an arrow with sawn board pickets.

The rear "addition" is a much simpler, two story brick Federal style building, with a shallow gable roof whose ridge is perpendicular to the street and has segmentally arched dormers matching those of the main building. There is a cornice with molded fascia and small brackets. The windows are two over two double hung wood sash with plain stone lintels and sills. There is a smooth limestone water table and rock faced limestone foundation. It is possible that this is the older building.

The interior of this building is largely intact, with golden oak panelling, ornamental plaster ceilings and cornice work.

The carriage house is a gracious, two story, brick, Second Empire structure, with patterned mansard roof below a medium hipped roof, surmounted by a two by two bay cupola. The cupola has a roof with intersecting, semi-circular arched

vaults, projecting eaves with a molded <code>fascia</code> and brackets. The windows are segmentally arched one over one double hung wood sash. Two segmentally arched dormers flank a central pavilion, which is capped by a bell-shaped pedimented arched roof with molded <code>fascia</code> and brackets on a <code>two-part fascia</code>. The pavilion itself is of running bond brick with quoins similar to the main building. The second floor hay door has round-headed panelled wooden doors, a semi-circular smooth-faced limestone lintel with rock faced spring blocks and keystone, and stone sill. The first floor "barn" doors are segmentally arched, panelled wood, with a segmentally arched lintel similar to the above. The body of the building is running bond brick with quoins and interesting brick banding and patterning in the second floor. The first floor windows are round-headed one over one double hung wood sash with limestone lintels and sills corresponding to those of the hay door. This building has been featured in several books on Victorian architecture. The interior of the carriage barn is largely intact.

Dr. Miller was also the first chairman of the Historic District Commission, serving from 1980-1985.






View of House and Carriage House from West


Detail of Main (West) Entry

A long-time village resident remembered a string of occupants later than the Races, beginning with George Washington Mead, a businessman and possibly a lawyer, often the executor of estates and a good adviser in business matters. He sold the house in the late 1870's to move to a larger house at 100 State Street.

Later the house was the home of Col. Henry T. Noyes. When he and his family left for Rochester, the house became the property of Dr. William Follett. Dr. Follett's daughter has owned the house since at least the early 1950's and occupied it with her husband, local attorney Henry Wm. Koch.





Born in Lansing, NY, in 1799, Hoskins came to Seneca Falls in 1829 when he moved his dry goods business from Bearytown (Fayette), a hamlet several miles south of Seneca Falls.
The house is quite late for one in classic Federal style. But it was appropriate for Hoskins, a man whose outlook was formed by the values of the early Republic.
Important for the early Republic was its belief in the natural rights doctrine of human equality. Thus it is not surprising that Charles Hoskins attended the first women's rights convention, held in Seneca Falls in 1848, and signed the Declaration of Sentiments. paneled door is particularly noteworthy. Other classical details include the broad, but simple entabulature.

Except for the movement of the kitchen and the changing of a pantry into a bathroom, the interior is intact. The hallway features a curved stairway. Egg and dart mouldings abound as well as interior window shutters and fine fireplaces.


of the convention's organizers, Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Stanton, in her autobiography, <u>Eighty Years and More</u>, mentions Hoskins' daughter, Frances, principal of the girl's department in the Seneca Falls Academy, as someone with whom she would discuss politics and religion. (p. 153.)

At the time of the 75th anniversary of the first convention the House was still in family hands. When the National Women's Party came to Seneca Falls to celebrate the anniversary and launch a campaign for what became the Equal Rights Amendment, it held one of the sessions of its two day meeting at the Hoskins House.

The building remained in family hands until 1953 when the Sanderson family bought it in the hopes of turning it into a funeral home, a development which proved to be unsuccessful due to opposition from the neighbors (Foote interview). In 1956, the Sandersons sold the house to its present owners.


Charles L. Hoskins was the proprietor of a dry goods store at the northeast corner of Fall and Cayuga Streets from 1829 until 1880. At one point a fire forced him to construct a new building, atop which he placed a clock. After the building's demolition in 1960's, the clock was relocated to the grounds of the Seneca Falls Historical Society at 55 Cayuga Street.

Hoskins' brother built a similar three bay, two story brick house at Canoga, a hamlet south of Seneca Falls on Route 89. It is unclear which building influenced which.

#### 18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE:

The side and rear elevations are roofed by a mansard roof of diamond-shaped slate tiles. There is a large triple-sided bay window on the south elevation, and a screened porch on the east elevation which overlooks the lake. The north elevation is articulated by a round oriel on heavy scroll brackets and by a round bay from ground to roof level, also topped by a mansard roof. The interior woodwork is as well preserved as that on the exterior.

# 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Sanderson Funeral Chapel, in July 1953. It was purchased by Charles and Shirley Hall in October 1958, by George and Shirley Patterson in October 1969, and in the late-1980s by Karl and Joanne Elliott.

According to local history, the house and its residents offered aid to slaves escaping north on the Underground Railroad. Other homes in the immediate area are well documented and exhibit architectural details corroborating the historical evidence. Such is not the case with this house. It was built on a lot already bounded by the railroad tracks on the north side, although Van Cleef Lake was not formed until 1915. At the time of the filling of the lake, residents stood in the backyard and watched the water level rise. Mr. and Mrs. Patterson are responsible for the plaque on the front façade with Laura Hoskins Hubbell's name and the date 1855.



Multiple additions have been built, primarily to the northeast. Today they have grown to greater size than the main building and would overpower it except that they are recessed. They are sympathetic to the main building also in that they share its roof style, detailing and fenestration.





to 1862 had the addresses 36, 38 and 40 Cayuga Street. Mr. Partridge imported brick masons from Canada to construct the building and imported interior embellishments from places he traveled, such as the Italian fireplace still remaining in the interior. Upon his death in 1879 at the age of 35, the home was willed to Partridge's wife, Marian, a relative of the Trinity Episcopal Church Rector, Rev. Guion. the left (south) side formed an L-shaped plan.

Between 1880 and 1892, the building was remodelled, resulting in its present Queen Anne form. This was accomplished by removing the roof, replacing it with a highly irregular roof, typical of the Queen Anne style. Window openings were altered, the new toothed in brick work obvious on the façade. An angled bay obscured the joint between the main building and the wing. A semi-circular bay was added to the south façade, further confusing the original simple massing. An enormous, ornate, two story porch, with detailing similar to the extant porte-cochère, stretched across the entire east façade, covering the first floor and a portion of the second. This portion was removed prior to the late 1950's when a hurricane felled a large tree on the porch, severely damaging it. The remains were subsequently removed. With the exception of the front porch then, the house stands today substantailly as it was in its second incarnation in the Queen Anne style.

windows are one over one wood sash with leaded stained glass upper sash. The casings are plain, and the windows are unified by a pedimented shared lintel which has 1880 engraved on it. This entire gable end projects from the façade and is supported by a cornice with decorated end brackets and modillions.

To the left (south) of this, the largest gable is a smaller dormer over a diagonally projecting rectangular bay. This gable end has similar detaling to the first, without the stickwork, and with a smaller, paired windows, again, with leaded stained glass upper sash. This gable projects only slightly from the wall.

There are nine small dormers with steep gabled roofs, projecting verges and eaves, decorated verge boards, slate shingles in the tympanum, and one over one double hung wood casement windows with leaded stained glass in the upper sash.

The north façade has a gable similar in size and detailing to the main entry gable, but without the stickwork patterning, or pedimented lintel.

There are seven chimneys; four have been shortened, but three of those in the outer wall retain their full height, with articulated flues and decoratively corbelled caps. These, and all chimneys in the outer walls have gabled "crickets" that project beyond the chimneys, forming dormers with decorated verge boards. The chimney on the main facade has decorative sandstone detailing.

A semi-circular bay on the south façade has a conical roof with ornamental finial and shed roofed dormer with tripartite windows.

The windows of the main (east) façade have chamfered sawn sandstone lintels and rectangular sawn sandstone lug sills. The casings are molded, the sash one over one double hung wood. The main entry is a doubled paneled oak door with chamfered lintel. All other windows have segmental brick arches, sawn sandstone sills, molded casings, and one over one double hung wood sash.

A rectangular one story, wood frame paneled bay with one over one double hung windows and leaded stained glass upper sash, projects from the center of the north facade. It has a narrow slate mansard roof with wrought iron

The ell on the left side of the main façade is infilled with a hipped roof porch, with massive chamfered square columns and brackets, and the porch rail is composed of square balusters.

A small stoop on the south façade (reconstructed in 1984) has a massive railing with ball finials. A rear porch on the southern leg of the building has been infilled, the detail similar to the front porch. A small, shed roofed clapboarded garage has been added to the porch.

The rear elevation of the main façade has a large L-shaped porte-cochère with a slate mansard roof and the massive columns of the front porch and the railing detailing of the side porch.

The building has a smooth limestone watertable and a rock-faced limestone foundation.

and Becker sold more land to bring the property down to its present  $2\frac{1}{2}$  acres. The carriage house was taken down after 1891. The Becker children lived in the house until 1961, when it was sold to the Seneca Falls Historical Society. As such, the house functions as a historical museum, includes a research library, extensive archives and holdings, women's rights material, local history, Victoriana, some original furnishings, wallpaper and rugs, and is open for the public to admire the oak and cherry interior woodwork, stenciled wallpaper, and stained and painted glass windows.

#### THE BEEHIVE:

This is a  $1\frac{1}{2}$  story, three by three bay, wood frame clapboarded Gothic Revival building, situated at the rear of the Historical Society lot. It has a steep gabled roof, with projecting eaves and verges, molded facia and scroll sawn verge boards, wooden finials, and narrow freize. There is a two-door central opening on the second floor. The first floor has four over four double hung wood sash, with plain casings and hood moldings. The doors have two panels with lancet arches.

In the early 1970's, the building was moved from another site on the lot, to its present position. It had apparently been used by Mrs. Becker's gardener.

#### THE TOWN CLOCK:

This is a two story, one by one bay structure, with a concave mansard roof of metal formed to resemble shingles and topped by the weathervane that has become the Historical Society's logo. The second floor is clapboarded with a large, circular clock in each face. The clock dial is of translucent glass with applied metal Roman numbers. The base is of multicolored brick, has a cast iron sign from the Seneca Falls Railroad Station, and is surrounded by a wrought iron fence.

The clock, clapboarded area and roof, were moved in the 1970's to this site from the building on the corner of Cayuga and Fall Streets. The building had been damaged by fire, and was subsequently torn down. A brick base was constructed and the top portion of what had been a several tiered tower was installed on it.



## 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This structure is in good condition and is an example of the then "modern" style being used in 1888 along side the earlier styles on Cayuga Street. The building date was given by the present owner, as none of the Sanborn maps for 1881 and 1886 record this area. The house was built by Attorney Charles Weed, a prominent Seneca Falls citizen. The home was then owned by his daughter and her husband, Attorney T.J. Yawger, also prominent in the community for his work as a lawyer and educator of law, as well as the county attorney for Seneca Falls. A son of the Yawgers, who also occupied the house, was a coal dealer.



Justus B. Johnson, who lived from 1812-1885, was president of the Exchange National Bank which was organized in 1865. A house was known to be on this site in 1856. Johnson's home may have been built in the early to mid 1860's, after the Second Empire homes at 32 and 30 Cayuga Street, especially the latter, belonging to Harrison Chamberlain, which is similar in style although more ornately trimmed. When Johnson died, he left provisions in his will for his wife to be taken care of and for his house and funds to be turned over to a board of trustees to establish a home for "worthy females of good character who may be in reduced or dependent circumstances." It became the Johnson Home for Indigent Females. The name was later changed to the Johnson Home for Women.





18. within one arched surround rest on stone sills. Rounded window dormers and 2 chimneys pierce the mansard roof. The Johnson Home is similar to Harrison Chamberlain's residence according to the photograph published in Grip's in 1904. The similarities between the carriage houses is especially striking. Johnson's is less ornate and was perhaps adapted from the Chamberlain residence. The rear addition has a hipped roof with gable dormers and rectangular 1/1 sash windows. An entrance wing on the south elevation is covered with aluminum siding and has a shed roof and cement steps.










Detail of Cupola on Main Building



Burt sold the home to David Lum, son of one of the early settlers of Seneca Falls, who organized Seneca Falls' first historical society. Following Lum's death, the house was purchased by William Pollard, a fourth generation offspring of a Seneca Falls family involved in mercantile, industrial, and civic affairs. Pollard was a superintendent at Rumsey and Company. The building remained in the Pollard family until 1961, when it was sold to Elmer and Lillian Farney. It remains in the Farney family today.



The structure remains in good condition and is the only example of a brick Gothic Revival building in Seneca Falls. The house was built for a Seneca Falls businessman, George Shipp, a member of one of Seneca Falls' founding families, the Van Cleefs. Shipp sold the structure to C.P. Rogers, a member of a prominent Seneca Falls family and an attorney in Seneca Falls, In 1910, Rogers sold the home to William J. and Grace Yawger Maier. The Maier and Yawger families were prominent as business and civic leaders. In 1962, the Maiers sold the property to J.D. and Rose Featherstone, who sold it to the present owner, Dr. Joseph Garceffo, in 1964.

This building remains in excellent condition and is a good example of architectural styles. According to the present owner of the house, it was built in 1856 by William Keith, a Seneca Falls merchant who was also active in civic and social affairs. At the time, the house was at the edge of the Cayuga Street residential neighborhood. After the Civil War, a growing middle class carried the neighborhood northward. The structure was later owned by the Seneca Falls dry goods merchant Mr. H. Blodgett and his wife, Elizabeth, and Ransom Micks, an employee of the Rumsey Pump Co. The home was then owned for 39 years by F.A. Souhan, involved in Seneca Falls business and civic affairs beginning with the family dairy, and through marriage. 





The history of the structures on this site is the story of the generational relations of a family of growing wealth. The first house on the site was built for Anthony S. Gay and sold to Seabury S. Gould II, son of the founder of the firm today known as Goulds Pumps. Gould's family and wealth outgrew the house. In the 1880's Gould moved the house across the street to 82 Cayuga Street and built himself a new house on a grander scale in the Queen Anne style (see Benjamin, p.12). The fashionableness of the Queen Anne passed but the Gould's wealth did not. Seabury II's son, Edward, demolished the house and later built a new house in the fashionable style of the day in the mid-20's.

The main roof has similar detailing with the following exceptions: the fascia has been replaced with a plain board, and the brackets spring from a wide freize with bracket and drop pattern ornaments.

The window casings are eared, and have molded lintels. The sash are 2/2 double hung wood. A wood water table sits above the rock-faced limestone foundation.

A simple, one-story shallow hipped roof porch has been added to the front facade and a similar, but two-story 4-bay porch has been added to the rear addition.



industries as Wilhelmus Mynderse." Upon his death in 1837, Frederick B. Swaby purchased the house and the land. Frederick B. Swaby was another member of the original business men and industrialists in Seneca Falls. Unlike nearly all the others in that group, Swaby derived his wealth from agriculture. His family occupied the house for over 100 years.

The Swabys contributed to the many structures which appear on Cayuga Street because they owned all the land in this area, selling off the family farm for lots over a seventy-five year period.

By the turn of the century, growth reached the Swaby house, and the family sold a lot to the north in 1903 for the first time. A member of the Garnsey family, who built a house there recalled the frugality of Frederick Swaby's descendents who lived at the homestead then. The descendents, a brother and sister, had a Christmas tradition of exchanging \$100 checks.



When Partridge ran the dry goods store, he sold everything from musical instruments to groceries to clothing. When Lathrop took over, he eliminated everything but the dry good inventory. The great fire in 1859 destroyed his store and goods, but he was well insured and rebuilt immediately. Some years later, he entered into a partnership with Thomas B. Baird, which lasted until 1873. That year, Lathrop's son Romeyn entered the family business. When William B. Lathrop retired about 1905, his son took over.(3) Lathrop was also the owner of a 200 acre farm from which he derived income.

Besides his son Romeyn, Lathrop had a daughter Harriett. The entire family belonged to Trinity Episcopal Church, where William Lathrop was a warden and a vestryman of many years.(5) Lathrop also served as a fireman in Engine Co. #2 of the Seneca Falls Fire Department from 1839 on, (6) and was a member of the Village Literary Association.(7)


He died in September, 1908 at the age of 92. He was a widower, his wife Harriett having died in 1894.(8)

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

Langdon and his wife Bessie had five children: Louis, Edgar, John, Joseph, and a daughter who became Mrs. B.B. Smith. He was survived by all of them when he died of Bright's disease at this home in 1905.(5)

The Keeler sisters were milliners and opened a shop on Cayuga Street in September 1867. Their advertisement read, "The attention of the ladies of Seneca Falls and vicinity is invited to an entire new stock of millinery goods, which we offer to them at our residence on Cayuga Street. The stock comprises a varity of bonnets, hats, ribbons, flowers. Bleaching & repairing done on short notice." They apparently remained on Cayuga Street until 1874 when they purchased the property on Clinton Street. Sarah J. Keeler is listed on the 1888 Directory as a milliner at 10 Clinton Street. Rhoda Keeler, widow of Silas Keeler, is listed as the owner of the property in 1881. In the 1894 Directory both women are listed as residents of the house, and Sarah J. Keeler is the owner on the 1896 map. Neither woman is listed in the 1900 Directory.





The left side entry is covered by a full length Italianate front porch which retains its original columns and brackets. Wrought iron railings and aluminum siding along soffits has been added, c. 1960. It has an asphalt roof and a stone foundation, c. 1930. of all the young men in the Village. Bellows left Charles Hoskins' employ and went into a grocery business with his father, known as CF Bellows and Son. They were located at 68 Fall Street. Bellows was also a communicant of the Trinity Episcopal Church.

In November 1884 Bellows assigned his house to Weed Barnum, who soon sold it to Bellow's mother Elizabeth. During this period, Delancey Bellows continued to live in the house. It is possible that the family business is not mentioned in later directories and during this same period he took a job as a travelling salesman.

In 1888 Delancey Bellows seems to have left town and Elizabeth Bellows sold the house to George Norton. Norton and his wife Nellie owned it until 1946, when James & Anna Sullivan bought it. The Sullivan's lived there until 1958; for tour years, selling it in 1962 to Peter and Marjorie King. The present owner, Duane W. Barto, bought it in 1965.



The Messingers were members of Trinity Episcopal Church and all their children baptized there between 1853-1867.

The house at 24 Clinton Street was sold to John and Martha Edwards in 1874. In 1875 it was bought by Margaret and Patrick Rogers. The Rogers' sold the house to M.L. Waldo in 1878. Sarah E. Campbell acquired the house in 1894 and sold it to Hattie L. Hawes in 1904. Hawes sold the property to Ethan Irland who lost the house in a mortgage foreclosure by the State Bank of Seneca Falls in 1917. The bank sold it in 1918 to Emily V. Carr who owned it until 1947. That year Joseph and Angelina Bianchini bought it, and in 1951 sold it to Antoinette Manzari. Who in the late-1980s sold it to Robert Gere.

William Vanderhoof was born September 22, 1842 in Caldwell, New Jersey, the son of Abram & Ann Vanderhoof. He was raised in New Jersey and on September 3, 1862, enlisted in the New Jersey Volunteers. He was wounded May 4, 1863, at the battle of Chancellorsville and was taken a prisoner of war. Confederate surgeons removed his right leg and in June of 1863 he was honorably discharged for his disability. In December of 1864 Vanderhoof came to Seneca Falls and opened a tabacconist shop on Fall Street. 

It is always a pleasure to place upon the page of history passing incidents in the life of as estimable a person as he whose name appears at the head of this sketch.

D. B. Lum was born at Chatham, Morris County, New Jersey, September 19, 1805. When one year of age, he came with his parents to Seneea Falls, where he still resides. He has lived to see the little cluster of buildings of 1806 changed to the beautiful and thriving village, and the country round about transformed from a wildeness to a land that blossoms like the rose. He early kerned the batter's trade, and by economy and a strict attention to business succeeded in gaining a competency of this world's goods. Mr. Lum, possessed of that modesty that always commands respect, has never forced himself upon the people as a claimant for public honors, though several times elected to the office of village trustee, discharging the duties with satisfaction to all and credit to himself. It is something remarkable that, in his long and active life, he has not sought for nor held a town office for a period of forty years. He has manifested much interest in matters of history concerning his village and county, and was instrumental in the organization of the "Historical Society of Seneca Falls," of which he is President. Mr. Lum has ever been governed by a conscientious regard for his obligations, and for the demands which every one owes to society and religion, notwithstanding his ever-present love for the humorous in life and the erjoyment of social pleasures.

The library was located in this house until the Barge Canal was re-routed in 1915, causing damage calling for riparian rights, which paid for the building of a new library on the site. Since the donation of the parcel of land for the library, the Association has been renamed the Mynderse Library Association.

Fornesi is remembered for single-handedly inducing several hundred Italians to immigrate to Seneca Falls. He interpreted for them, helped them find jobs and housing, and was a charter member of the SMS, an Italian Mutual Aid Society. He died at his home on Mynderse Street in 1936.

Fornesi sold the building to the Seneca Falls Savings Bank in May 1934. The bank owned it until June 1943, when it was sold to George and Monetta Cooley. The Souhan family owned the building from 1950-1978, during which time it was used as offices, apartments, and home for the Reveille printing press. In 1978, Donald and Betty D'Amico purchased the property. Dr. D'Amico has his dental offices there and converted the open rear portion to offices and added a side entrance. The structure was sold in 1985 to Donald Ritter, and then to Anthony D'Amico.

This is the only recognizable Federal style building remaining on Fall St. The earliest available records show that the building was transferred from S. Nash to Crandall Kenyon in 1840. Susan Haog was the owner of the building in 1896. In 1914, Mrs. Lay operated a piano store there and by 1921, A.E. Lawless held the building and had a music store. Other inhabitants reputedly were a tinsmith and a television and radio store. In 1964, the building was bought by Mr. Caralla from Mr. Dilmore, an interior decorator. The Caralla's operated a store there until Mr. Caralla's death in 1978. Mrs. Caralla lived on the second floor and rented the first until the building was bought by Dr. August Sinicropi in 1982.

It is now used as a Day Care Center.





Permastone veneer on the first floor, and stucco on the second, are facings which have been added to three sides of the building. The fourth side, facing 37 Fall St., reveals the original brick and clapboard materials. An asphalt veneered frame bridges 35 and 37 Fall St., with an alley door and a second story stairwell door.

The bank has had various names, including puse, the Bank of Seneca Falls, the First National Bank as State Bank of Seneca Falls. After 1922, when the bank

was moved to the west corner of Fall and Cayuga Streets, the Seneca Falls Historical Society and the Red Cross were headquartered in the building until 1960, followed by a barbershop, a businessman's club, a pizza parlor, and an appliance store. In 1978, Dr. Sinicropi bought the building, which he currently occupies.





An 1888 Village Directory lists Gerard William's Grocery as occupying the building. In 1910 the building is listed as vacant. In 1914 several residents lived in the building; William A. Richards ran a barbershop, and Edward Jones operated a cigar shop. From the 1920's through the 1940's, automobile garages and repair shops were located here. In 1966 and 1973 Village Directories indicate several residents and the Village Civil Defense Board as occupants. Presently the building is occupied by Filthy McNasty's Saloon on the first floor. The interiors of the second and third floors are being repaired after a fire in 1985.





The original building most likely was two and a half stories tall with a raking or stepped gable on the east elevation. A fanlight, characteristic of the Federal style, can still be seen on this elevation. It is also interesting to note that the simple rectangular windows on the east elevation are lower than the more Italianate style arched windows of the facade. altered, is among the very oldest in Seneca Falls.

In December 1859, a fire occurred on the southside of Fall Street, destroying many neighboring structures. This building was probably at least partially destroyed by the fire. Rather than being totally demolished, however, at least the east wall was retained and an additional story added to the main block of the building. New construction along Fall Street began within months following the fire. It appears that the remodelling to the Italianate style was done in 1860.

An 1862 Village Directory indicates that Thomas B. Sharpe owned a "drugs and crockery" shop at 41 Fall Street while Josiah T. Woodworth ran a dry goods store at #43. Woodworth moved out sometime between 1867 and 1888. Sharpe's enterprise, however, remained until sometime between 1915 and 1921. Due to this long-term occupancy, the building and area has been termed "Sharpe's block" or "corners".

From the early 1920's through the 1940's, several businesses were located in the Fall St. store fronts. In the mid-sixties both store fronts were vacant and in 1973 #a] was vacant and #43 housed Ryan's Furniture warehouse. Until 1982, Fragnoli's Super ARmy & Navy Store was located in #41 and #43 was vacant. Today Minisci's Italian restaurant is in #41 and Quattro's Italian delicatessen, #43.

The Ovid St. wing may be original to the 1821 construction of the main block or a somewhat later addition. Clearly, sometime after 1873 the mansard roof with diamond-shaped dormers were added. An 1888 Village Directory indicates Michael E. Hanlin operated a restaurant at 2 Ovid St. In 1910 Edward Jones operated a saloon at #2 and resided at #4 according to a Directory of that year. However, a Sanborn Map of the same time does not indicate the presence of a commercial operation at 2 Ovid St. but does indicate a restaurant as occupying #4. By the late 1940's only residents are listed at 2 and 4 Ovid St. in Village Directories and after that time no listing appear associated with these numbers.

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



from a Mrs. Harrison Chamberlain who had inherited the property as part of the Seymour estate. Before his move to #47, Baird had operated a dry goods store at 67 Fall St. However by 1886, Baird, "for several years one of the best known and most successful merchants of Seneca Falls", had moved to 51 Fall St. When Baird moved out, a long-time employee, J.H. Anderson, started business with a partner (Stephen Monroe) and continued the dry goods business. In 1890, Anderson bought out Monroe. He remained at #47 until his retirement in 1935, having worked in the dry goods business at this location for 64 successive years.


The J.H. Crowell Grocery was a long-time occupant of 49 Fall St. (from at least 1894 to 1914). It was followed by another grocery, the Market Basket, which operated from approximately 1921 to 1935. Thus, both 47 and 49 Fall St consistently housed one type of business--#47, dry goods, and #49, a grocery--from 1860 to at least 1935. A 1947 Directory lists the V.F.W at 47 Fall St., and Ward's Candy shop at 49. Today, the V.F.W. remains in 47 while DeJohn's Office Supply is at 49.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
In December of 1859 a fire destroyed the building previously standing on the lot of 51-53 Fall St. A December 22, 1860 newspaper article indicates the present structure was built in that year for Mr. W.F. Williams and a Mr. Keith who moved into stores in the eastern portion of the building, (# 51) and a Mr. Seely who moved into another store in the building (# 53).

The article notes the builders as Messr. Latham and Benham. W.F. Williams, a jeweler and watchmaker had been located in this pre-fire building from approximately 1856 to the time of the fire. From 1860 to 1867 he located his shop in the newly constructed building. By 1867, he had moved to 69 Fall St. (It is not known if W.F. Williams was related to the jeweler who began Williams and Son Jewelers presently located on the north side of Falls St.).

Other occupants included William Keith, a merchant tailor, who occupied a portion of 51 Fall St. from 1860 to sometime prior to 1867. According to an 1862 Village Directory, C.W. Seeley, partners with a Mr. Hood, occupied the building from 1860 to approximately 1867, by which time he had apparently dissolved his partnership with Hood and moved to 45 Fall St. In 1867, Henry C. Blodgett moved from 47 Fall St. to 51 Fall St. where he continued his dry goods business until December 1889,

In 1867, George B. Davis and Son, Druggists and Booksellers were located at 53 Fall St. Davis, a doctor, had come to Seneca Falls from Syracuse in 1853. He was elected Supervisor of the Town of Seneca Falls in 1859 and was president of the village of Seneca Falls from 1860-1862. An 1888 Village Directory indicates Davis entered into a partnership with a Mr. Casey and continued the drug and book business until sometime prior to 1894 at which time Casey and Seaman, druggists and booksellers, are listed at this address with Davis listed as a clerk. In 1902, Davis is again listed as running his own book and drug store while Casey and Seaman are not listed. In 1910, Davis had apparently entered another partnership, this time with a Mr. Harpst, and continued the same business at this location until someime prior to 1914, by which time the Central Drugstore had opened at 53 Fall Street.

In December, 1889, Thomas Baird, who had previously operated a dry good store at 67 and later 47 Fall St., purchased 51 Fall (and perhaps 53 also) and moved into #51, where he continued his dry goods business. Baird was noted "for several years (as) one of the best known and most successful merchants in Seneca Falls". His dry goods store was so successful that it was continued "by his estate under the management of his former employees" after his death in 1893 to sometime between 1935 and 1947. In 1904 it was written that the store comprised several hundred square feet of space on two floors. A small arts shop occupies only the first story.

Other occupants of 51 Fall St. included an ice company in the 1920's (along with the Baird Store) as well as one and sometimes two residents. Sometime between 1935 and 1947 the Victoria Restaurant took the place of the Baird Store and remained in business until sometime between 1966 and 1973 when, according to a (cont.)



Shaw gave up his interest in 1837 and Partridge came from Cayuga to give personal attention to the business. He opened an exchange office in his store in 1848. About 1860 the National Banking System was created and Partridge applied for a charter. In 1862 the bank became the 1st National Bank of Seneca Falls. In May, 1864 he sold the merchantile business and became a private banker. He was the fir- president of the bank and his son Leroy C. Partridge was the cashier. - 11. An addition to the bank was built in 1963. Air conditioning was put in the entire building in 1962.
- 17. It contributes strongly to the area.
- 20. Fall St (37). That building is now owned by Dr. A.P. Sinicropi and was at one time the home of the Seneca Falls Historical Society. Partridge died in 1873 and his son Leroy took the presidency, until his death in 1875. In 1882 the National Bank Charter expired and for the next twenty years the business was operated as "The Partridge Banking House". In 1902 a charter was granted by New York State and it became the State Bank of Seneca Falls, N.Y.

About 1920 the property at the corner of Fall and Cayuga Streets was purchased from Waldo G. and Adelaide Partridge Morse and plans were made for a new home for the bank.

Previously on that site stood a tavern, as shown in an early view of Seneca Falls in 1817. It was a two-story gabled building. On the 1873 Birds' Eye View there stood at that site a three-story building with a cupola - the Globe Hotel. This is confirmed on the 1881 and 1886 Sanborn Maps. Around 1900 Mrs. Sarah Beck located her real estate, piano and organ business there. Part of the building was occupied by a barber shop. In 1920 the State Bank purchased the building. A contract was made with Charles J. Defendorf of Auburn for the reconstruction of the building. The plans were made by Mart L. Van Kirk of Waterloo. The bank also purchased the frame building on Cayuga St. occupied by the barbershop of Eugene Stahlnecker. This structure was torn down and the bank added 16 feet on to its building frontage. The three floors of the building structure were entirely changed. The exterior was faced with gray Litholite blocks.

The inauguration of the new home of the State Bank seemed to have been a great event in Seneca Falls. The Reveille dedicated a full page to it and the important businesses of Seneca Falls greeted the bank. The newspaper proclaimed: "...the banking room entrance faces Fall Street and is composed of two sets of Honduras mahogany doors. The wainscotting is of Italian marble as are the window sills. The screens and all desks, tables and counters and chairs are of Honduras mahogany. The grills are of bronze..."

In 1956 an outside banking window was constructed and it replaced the fourth window from the corner on Cayuga Street.

In 1962 the bank constructed an addition on Cayuga Street and the interior was completely remodelled.

This building is a fine example of Academic Revival design in Seneca Falls and was one of the last important buildings built on Fall Street, marking the end of a period of growth in Seneca Falls.




In 1910, Daniel O'Keefe's Wholesale and Retail Liquors occupied the building. Between 1914 and 1935, several businesses entered and left this address. 





altered with large plate glass aluminum framed windows with fixed glass transoms slightly angling in toward a central glass door with aluminum framed fixed  $\frac{1}{2}$ transom window. Fluted aluminum panels cover the flanking brick bearing walls. The east side has an assymetrically stepped parapet wall, and parging over the original brick work. The rear (north) facade is also parged, with iron gratings on the second floor windows and a wood frame addition.

Upon his retirement in 1885, Mrs. Cox-Fralich enlarged the business, taking full possession of the premises and stocking up with everything in the line of ladies wear. It was one of the largest stores in town and in consequence of the variety of goods Mrs. Fralich handled, it was favored with an extensive trade exclusively in the very best line of goods. Here it was that the ladies were supplied with the best, including tailor made suits, ordered by measurement from the French tailors in New York and guaranteed perfect fit. Mrs. Fralich had the experience of 25 years as a milliner and was regarded as competent and up-to-date.

From 1885 to c. 1910, Mrs. Emma Cox-Fralich ran her millinery store at this address. For a few years, the store remained vacant before McConnel opened up a saloon here in 1914. Emens and Dobson later converted the space into a leather goods store in 1920. From 1935 to c. 1965, the first Crayton's Drug Store was located at this address before moving to larger quarters farther up Fall St.

Two stories were removed from the building in 1948 and renovations to the first floor retail space were made. From the mid to late 1960's, the commercial space remained vacant until Seneca Office Supply opened a retail outlet there in 1970. The current occupant of the first floor commercial space is Sinicropi Florist. Joyce N. Sinicropi, the current owner of the building and business, opened her florist shop in December of 1976.

On October 1, 1924, the Exchange National Bank became known as the Seneca County Trust Company and on October 30, 1957 the bank merged with the Lincoln National Bank and Trust Company of Syracuse, New York. In 1975, the Lincoln Bank purchased the adjoining Elk's Building at 66-68 Fall Street and began an extensive rehabilitation.

The formerly elaborate three and a half story brick structure known as the Old Elk's Building, built c. 1884; featured a red mansard roof, and two shed roof dormers with fish scale sides. The second and third stories contained arched windows with mansard arched surrounds and craftsman inspired architectural elements. The Elk's held their meetings in the upper floors of the structure and for many years the Rose Frances Dress Shop and Spenton's Grill or Muldoon's occupied the first floor commercial space. At the time of the renovation, Mrs. Frances moved her dress shop further up on Fall Street and Muldoon's ceased to exist.

In 1975, the Lincoln Bank was housed at 70 Fall Street in an aluminum-paneled building which had been applied to cover a brick facade in the 1950s. When the renovation and expansion occurred in 1976, the structure at 66-68 Fall Street lost its mansard roof and produced the existing two and a half story structure.



An 1862 Village Directory indicates William Pollard ran a boot and shoe shop in the building at this time. Grip's Historical Souvenir of Seneca Falls indicates that Pollard came to Seneca as a child in 1819 and "in early life engaged in the grocery business in Mechanics Hall and was there when that landmark burned in 1859". Pollard was a trustee and treasurer of the Seneca Falls Academy and a supervisor of the town at one time. He remained in the building until sometime between 1867 and 1882, the latter date being when George Norton, a baker and confectioner opened his shop here. Norton remained in the building until sometime between 1910 and 1914. In 1921 the building housed Bett's Bakery and from at least 1927 through at least 1935 housed Bosburg and Cory Shoes. Other occupants of the building include McMahon Shoes in 1947, Ceo and Rutz Shoes in 1966 and The Bridal Boutique in 1973. In February 1981 the Playhouse, an amusement games business moved to the building.

A photograph of the building in 1936 and another between 1921 and 1935 show that an additional  $\frac{1}{2}$  story had been added to the structure. The addition was one of the I talianate style, with corbelling along the cornice and below three short windows, so that perhaps it was constructed by about 1880 or just after.

The exact date the top stories of the building were removed is not known. A 1925 Sanborn Map, updated in 1955, indicates 67 Fall St. as a  $3\frac{1}{2}$  story building; however, at least one long-time business merchant on Fall St. remembers the building as being two stories in height prior to 1955. The 1936 photo documents that the top stories were removed after this date.

The newly fitted store with its extensive stock is one of the handsomest in Western new York, as evident by their increasing business and the ability of Williams and Son to maintain their reputation of having the best. The store and the fine stock carried would be a credit to a metropolitan city. His store was well arranged and his stock always complete; his experience in his business is extensive and his friends, numerous.

Seneca Falls Directories indicate that in 1867, William F. Williams, jeweler was located at 91 Fall Street. It appears that this building might have survived the "Fire of 1890". From 1888 until the present time, Williams and Son have operated their jewelry business continuously from this location. The character and quality of Williams and Son jewelry Store is a good reminder of the character of late 19th century Seneca Falls.

"It was in Seneca Falls on July 19 and 20 in 1848 that Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott convened the first Women's Rights Convention. It was this convention which sparked the long but eventually successful battle for Women's Suffrage - the nucleus from which recognition of Women's Rights emerged."2

To date, 31 women have been inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame. The first Honors Ceremony was held on August 23, 1973, with 20 Additional Honors Ceremonies were held in October 1976, October 1979, July 1981 and July 1982. Within the Museum, the stories of Susan B. Anthony, Jane Addams, Clara Barton, Harriet Tubman, Helen Keller, Eleanor Roosevelt, Mary McLeod Bethune, Dorothea Dix, Margaret Mead, Dr. Helen Brooke Iaussig, and many more, are told through portraits, photographs, letters and memorabilia. Special exhibits, changing every few months, focus on the interpretation of some aspect of women's lives.







A newspaper article of May 21, 1915 indicated the present structure was designed by Taber, Baxter, and Nobel, Architects, and constructed by R.H. Howes Company. The building was funded by Josiah T. Miller who also financed a number of other structures in Seneca Falls including the King Block (1891), the State Street Opera House (1892), the Columbus Block (1894), and the Century Block (1901). The three or four story Desky Block, which collapsed on March 28, 1902, previously stood at this site. The Village Directories indicated that Stahlvecker's Barbershop, Heit Tailor Shop, Seneca Press Co. remained in the building until at least 1966; a number of other offices and businesses were located in the building during these years. 



Miller was "presently" erecting a building on the site of the recently collapsed Desky Block. The Desky Block stood on the lots occupied today by Seneca Clothing and The Arcade at 81-85 Fall St. Since the lot at 81-83 remained vacant until 1915, this account was referring to the structure currently standing at 85-87 Fall St. It is probable that Joshua T. Miller did not actually construct the building, but provided financing, as he had done for many other village buildings. Village

Directories indicate Frank Baver operated a Cigar Shop in the eastern portion of the structure from approximately 1910 to 1914. The 1921 Village Directory lists both 85 and 87 Fall St. as vacant lots; however, a photograph of about this time indicates the building was still standing but had been completely gutted by fire.

By 1935, W.T. Grant Co. had moved into the building. They remained until the building's current occupant, the Seneca Clothing Co., moved in in 1959. Prior to 1914, the Seneca and Cayuga Canal ran directly behind the rear of the building. When the canal was reconstructed in 1914, the water was moved about 100 feet to the south. The building was enlarged by about 30 feet to the south; the eastern portion was expanded somewhat farther than the western portion.

The 1881 Sanborn map shows that the building which stood on this site prior to this hardware store was a wood-frame structure. In 1862 this previous building was occupied by D.H. Wilson, a dry goods merchant and grocer. That building was undoubtedly destroyed by the 1890 fire. The first record of occupancy after the fire is 1910, by owner George B. Davis. Davis had been born in the village in 1853, son of physician and druggist George W. Davis.

From 1910 to around 1920, Dr. T.J. Mangan had offices within this building and from 1920 until around 1938, the Gillette-Talmadge Company maintained offices within this structure. From 1939 to the present time first the Pinckney and Hadley Hardware Store and later the Hadley Hardware Supply Store have occupied the first floor commercial space.

After the fire of 1890 he relocated in the Post Office Building on State Street. At some point in the 1890's, 88 Fall Street was erected as part of a row of similar commercial structures and after 1902, Gay and Son moved to this location. In 1902 his son, John S. Gay, took charge of the insurance and real estate company and has continued the firm name of Gay and Son ever since. Their offices were located at 88 Fall Street from circa 1902 to circa 1926 before moving to State Street. A 1912 Reveille article on Gay and Son indicated that:  They are experts in all branches of insurance and represent 22 of the leading fire insurance companies of the country.

This firm also does a large business in life and casualty insurance. All losses are paid promptly and satisfactorily. Special attention is given to insurance counsel and advice. The father, Albert S. Gay, died in 1905 when the son succeeded him to the business. John S. Gay was admitted to the bar in 1905 and has been in general practice of his profession since that time. In the real estate department he stands ready at any time to buy, sell exchange or lease, or take full charge of property for non-residents.

When John S. Gay moved the firm to a new building on State Street, John Laskaris, proprietor of a confectionary shop, took over the commercial space at 88 Fall Street and remained at this location from approximately 1928 to circa 1953. From 1954 until 1960, The Alps Restaurant was located here. Later Eisenhower College rented space for a brief period of time and currently Hadley's Hardware has expanded its commercial square footage into this building.



early 1890's and this company was located within the King Block. In an 1894 directory, J.T. Miller is listed as Vice President and Treasurer of this firm. During this period, Miller was the largest land holder in the county. His father was a prominent judge who taught Josiah T. Miller the legal profession. However, difficulty in hearing prevented him from entering the profession of law. Miller died in Los Angeles in 1922 of a fractured skull suffered from a fall in a tub.

Early occupants of the King Block include the American Express Company from circa 1902 to circa 1920 at 92 Fall Street; the Metropolitan 5 and 10 Cent Store from circa 1912 to circa 1928 at 94 Fall Street, and the Sugar Bowl from circa 1910 to circa 1928 at 98 Fall Street. In the 1930's, a number of grocery stores leased commercial space in the King Block. The A&P Grocery Store was located here from circa 1938 to circa 1960, followed by the Seneca Falls I.G.A. In 1960, the Capital Finance Corporation opened an office at 90 Fall Street and in 1972 moved to the Daniels Block. Around 1973, Robinette Jeweler's opened a shop at 92 Fall Steet and circa 1975. Crayton's Drug Store took over much of the King Block for a large retail pharmaceutical outlet. The Post-Standard News Bureau occupied space on the second level of this building for many years.



# 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The Columbus Block, also known as the Miller Block, was erected by J.T. Miller in 1894. J.T. was the son of Josiah T. Miller, a Judge, editor and real estate investor, and followed in his father's footsteps as a developer by building the Century Block, King Block, and the Opera House Block as well as the Columbus Block, following the 1890 fire. The Columbus Block could possibly have been designed by architect Mart Van Kirk of Waterloo, who did the Partridge Block in 1891, as the balustrade treatment and the frieze panels over the shopfronts are very similar, but there is no proof of this.

The pre-fire structure that stood on the site, according to the 1881 Sanbarn map, was brick with wood on the south (rear) facade, banked with 3 stories in 21. SOURCES:


the front and seven at the rear, and contained a sporting goods store, N.W. Jennings Millinery (of 89 State Street), a harness shop and bookstore. The present structure, according to Sanborn maps, is built of wood over a steel frame. The change from brick before the fire to wood after the fire seems ironic, although presumably the steel framing was fireproofed. The "tail race" of the Seneca River ran behind both the pre-fire and the post-fire structures until the Barge Canal's alterations of 1915 (although the buildings did not back directly on to the water but were separated by a strip of land).

Early tenants of the present building included Myer Todtman, the Atlantic and Pacific Tea Co., the Postal Telegraph Co., the U.S. Express Company, and Nellie Allen, millinery and fancy goods (of the Allen House on &3 State). Meyer Todtman's clothing store was a Seneca Falls institution. Todtman, who lived at 180 Fall Street, was born in 1856 in Elmira. He opened a store with Henry Gladke, the "Mammoth Clothing House," in the Desky Building in 1879, which became Todtman and Gladke. He then moved to the Sheldon Block (Miller Arcade) and in 1894 bought out Gladke and rented a store in the newly completed Columbus Block, which he remained in until his death in 1923. A model businessman, whose store flourished for 44 years, and highly regarded by the community, at Todtman's death all local businesses were closed during the funeral service in his honor.

Seneca Clothing moved in where Todtman was in 1923, and remained there until 1959 when they moved next door to 87 Fall. Curry Appliances at that time purchased the building, and occupied the space where Todtman used to be. Smith & Jones Music Store now occupies the space at 95-97.

Radiating voussoirs, granite sills and an indented corner storefront spans the first floor retail space. 

who was the son of a recent Irish immigrant and who built many houses in the fourth ward. Upon completion of the work, the hotel featured 50 rooms, a dining room that could accommodate 100 and was favored by those traveling on the Waterloo Seneca Falls trolley line, and the New York Central Railroad.

In 1918, fire again swept through the Hoag Hotel. The site was then purchased by Goulds Pumps. The Hotel Gould used some of the remaining walls and bricks from the Hoag and added a fourth story. Some of the diamond patterning from the Hoag's cornice is still visible in some areas. In 1959 the hotel was purchased by BantuvanisHotel Corporation. During the 1960's and 70's, the hotel fell upon hard times and was operating at a loss. The GPM Corporation purchased the hotel in 1980. After stabilizing the building, the GPM started to rehabilitate the interior. In April of 1981, the exterior was painted and the hotel was officially reopened. Its opening was heralded a success and the Hotel Gould is once again worthy of its reputation as a Seneca FAlls landmark.

plane, and supporting a plain frieze topped by an elaborate cornice containing egg and dart and dentil moldings, and large icanthus leaf brackets which support the balustrade, which is crowned by a small pediment over the central bay and a pair of urns resting on bases with scrolled brackets. Second story windows are capped by radiating voussoirs, with the second and sixth bays treated as three-sided bay windws, framed by wooden surrounds with egg and dart molding on each of the four sides. A wooden cornice separates the first and second stories, with clover-shaped ornament in the friezes over each bay. Many of the ornamental features (brackets, capitals) are of copper, recently painted with a white rustoleum.

The south (rear) facade is more plainly treated, in typical brick commercial row style but without any ornamental features. Walnut ceilings survive on the second floor interiors (the first floor and basement now composition board). Overall styling of the structure is a hybrid of Italianate-Georgian Revival.

The Partridge Block is rich in history and associations not only for its link with Erastus Partridge but for the role the site has played in two centuries of Seneca Falls history. The present building, named only in memory of Partridge, is actually the third structure on the site. The first was the Old Arnett Mill. Of this structure, and the building that replaced it, the <u>History of Seneca County</u> 1786-1876 reports:

For forty years the 'old stone mill' at the head of State Street was a landmark, and an institution in Seneca Falls. Its foundations are of solid stone masonry. In 1865, Albert Jewett purchased the property, and in 1867 it became a portion of the property of the "Phoenix Mill Company," of which Mr. Jewett was President. All at once demolition began; the roof came off; the stone walls came down to the level of Fall Street, and the foundations were brought forward to the line of the street, making the dimensions one hundred by one hundred feet. Upon this foundation went up one of the finest brick blocks in Western New York. On the Fall Street front the block is two-storied, with a mansard roof, and in the center is an imposing tower, forty feet above the roof, in which is placed one of Fasoldt's astronomical clocks, one of the finest in the country, and visible from almost all parts of town...1

The writer goes on to describe the building, known as "Jewett's Block" (which is shown on the 1881 Sanborn map as he describes it), and the tenants inside, which included the Courier, the Reveille, the American Express Office and the Post Office (of which Josiah T. and J.T. Miller are then listed as postmasters, and all of the letter work furnished by Horace W. Knight of State St.).

Old photographs of this structure, such as Grip's Historical Souvenir of Seneca Falls, refer to it as "The Partridge Block. (Site of the Old Arnett Mill), burned July 30, 1890."2 How or why the name was changed from Jewett's to Partridge is uncertain, although there is a connection in that LeRoy C. Partridge, Erastus' son, is listed in the 1867-1868 Gazeteer as treasurer of Phoenix Mills, Jewett's company, of which the property belonged. Perhaps LeRoy C. took over the company, or bought the building from Jewett or his estate, and re-named it for his father.

The Partridge or "Jewett's" Block was completely destroyed during the 1890 fire, and the August 1, 1890 issue of the Seneca Falls Reveille described it as the most sweeping loss of the fire, for it was "the arcade of the village." But optimism was not lost, for within a year's time there arose from the ashes the present structure. In 1891 Mrs. Ellen B. Partridge, widow of Leroy C., erected the new Partridge Building on the ruins of the old block. When completed, the Seneca County Courier described it as "the most aesthetic structure yet erected in Seneca Falls. Its style suggests the airiness of oriental architecture and recalls descriptions of the palaces of Delhi and Allabahad." A central clock tower contained a mammoth arc light which lit a large part of the village, though described as not as high as lighted clock tower on the previous block. There were originally six stores on the first floor, with twelve offices and "bachelor apartments" upstairs.

After Mrs. Partridge's bankruptcy in 1901, trustees sold it in 1905 to the Clary Brothers, clothing store operators, for \$26,900, the largest transaction the town had known for years,5 who renamed it the Clary Building. In 1950 Ella J. Clary died and left the building to five of her children. In 1966 F.A.J. Inc., a domestic corporation, purchased the building and renovated and restored it.

Tenants of the present Partridge Block have included a wide array of bookstores, clothing (the Clary Brothers store from c. 1914-1947), dentists, lawyers, newspapers (the Courier from c. 1891-1940), beauty shops and citizens clubs, and the same eclectic mix is reflected today. The longest surviving tenant is James F. Sullivan, cigars, from c. 1910, although the longest recorded tenant was Western Union, from 1891-c. 1966.

The Partridge Building was, once again, gutted by a fire on March 17, 1987. the present owner is undertaking a complete historic renovation of the building.







This building and its neighbor the Partridge Block, stand on the site of the land-mark Jewett Block, a monumental  $2\frac{1}{2}$  story brick building with a mansard roof and clock tower destroyed by the 1890 fire. The present structure appears on the 1892 map and was likely built just after the Partridge Block. It was owned for a while by the Clary Brothers, who owned the Partridge Block during the first part of this century, and was the site of the Post Office from c. 1900-1932, when they moved to 36 State St. On the lower floors at that time were the Journal Publishing Co. and the Seneca Falls Electric Co., with a generator powered by the "tail race", part of the Seneca River, that ran underneath the building before the construction of the Barge Canal in 1915. On March 17, 1988, this building was, once again, gutted by a fire.

### 126 Fall Street:

The Wesleyan Chapel site, most recently a laundromat with apartments upstairs, has been acquired by the Women's Rights National Historical Park, National Park Service, to renovate and restore the remains of the Wesleyan Chapel, site of the first women's rights convention, July 1848. Historic and architectural documentation of the building is available at the Women's Rights Park, Seneca Falls. The entire building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

### 128-32 Fall Street:

The Strand Theater, which stands on the site of the Fisher Theater, which burned in 1972, is presently being considered for purchase by the Women's Rights National Historical Park, for inclusion in their renovation and design of the former Wesleyan Chapel, site of the first women's rights convention, July 1848.







This building was originally constructed as Boyce's Garage in 1914. The village became interested in the building in 1926 while looking for office space. The building became available when the garage's mortgage was fore closed. The Boyce building was favored over a new building because the renovation of a building was cheaper than new construction. On February 11, 1927 the town voted on the proposal to buy the building for \$28,000. An architect from Geneva, Lloyd Philo Adams submitted plans that considerably reduced the projected renovation costs. After renovation, the building housed the village's water department, jail, police department, Village Court and truck barn. Meanwhile Boyce's Garage moved to a new location on the corner of Fall and Walnut Streets.





View of Village Hall from Southwest





20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This church was originally built by the Wesleyan Methodist Congregation. The Wesleyan Methodists were first organized on March 27, 1843 after splitting from the Methodist Episcopal Church over the question of slavery. Funds were raised through subscription and church records indicate the church council was responsible for many elements of the building's basic design. Before erecting their new church, the Wesleyan Methodists had held services in a chapel on the western corner of Fall and Mynderse Streets. That building was the site of the first women's rights convention.

In June of 1920, the Baptist Society of Seneca Falls sold their building at Center and West Bayard Streets to the Sons of Italy for \$4,500. In turn, they bought the Wesleyan Methodist Church on Fall Street at the corner of Clinton Street. The purchase price of the new building and the cost of repairs and new furnishings was estimated at \$12,735, leaving over \$8,000 to be secured. Pledges in the amount of \$9,500 were secured from friends of the Society to pay off the debt over a five year period. This church was utilized by the Baptist Society until the late 1960's. At that time interest in relocation became evident as the congregation grew and more space was needed for Sunday school purposes and parking facilities. To this end, the Mosher property on N.Y.S. Route 89 across from Eisenhower College was purchased and a new church was dedicated in June of 1972. Once again, the church was sold by the Baptists to the First Assembly of God, who are the current owners.

While James expanded his interests into insurance and retailing, his sons, Clarence and William, began pursuing careers as well. Clarence graduated from the University of Rochester in 1880 and served as principal of the Seneca Falls Schools for the following two years. From 1884 till 1888, the brothers joined with J. N. Hammond to operate a law firm and set up a practice of their own at that time. Over the years the brothers enjoyed tremendous success and one publication observed that there was "no legal firm in Seneca Falls more widely or favorably known throughout this section of New York than the MacDonald brothers".

The family owned the home until 1949 when it was bought by the Wards.



doctor. Born in nearby Canoga on July 10, 1870, Dr. Brown had applied to medical school following her marriage to Dr. Harvey Brown in 1891. She received her M.D. degree from Syracuse University in 1897 and moved to Seneca Falls in 1904. Her greatest achievement came six years later when she renovated the former Silsby home on lower Fall Street to create Seneca Falls' first hospital. Her management of this facility was termed "highly successful" and, through a \$20,000 bond issue, the town took charge of the hospital in 1923. That same year she moved to this property on Fall Street and converted the front porch into a doctor's office.

Pr. Brown sold her home in 1926 to Dr. and Mrs. Robert Gibbs--newlyweds.
Mrs. Gibb recalled that even when they first arrived in the 1920s, the "farm-house" they had bought was thought to be as much as 80 years old.

His first store was opened with Henry Gladke in 1879; their partnership lasted until January 1894. During that time Todtman emerged as an aggressive business leader in the community, advertising in every issue of the Seneca Falls Reveille for 25 years. When he died in December 1923, all Seneca Falls businesses closed down for the hour of his funeral service.
Another long-term resident was Mame Knight, whose family operated Knight's Letter Pattern Manufacturing on State Street. She lived in the house from 1927 to 1965.



The lot that 184 Fall Street is located upon is unusual in that it was not part of the Thompson family farm that affected the development of nearby homes. The area, along with the lot with the current 186 Fall Street, was transferred to Sarah Metcalf from Francis Henry on March  $\overline{8}$ , 1867. There is no indication of a structure on the site by the 1873 Bird's Eye Map of Seneca Falls but a home was undoubtedly on the site when this section of the Metcalf property was sold for \$1500 to Augusta Mickley on October 20, 1894. This structure is depicted on the 1896 insurance map of Seneca Falls.

The Mickley's son Harold became a M.D. around 1910 and, while the doorway has been sealed up, the West side of the home's first floor is clearly laid out as (cont.)





20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The house sits on one of the first lots released by the Thompson family for development on this section of West Fall Street. It was sold to David Deming on December 24, 1856 for \$220--a low price if, in fact, a building was on the site by that date. A Waterloo antique dealer familiar with the structure has estimated that the home was built around 1843, however. In either case, Deming is listed at home at this location in 1862.

A structure on an 1852 map cannot be identified as this home with certainty. David Deming was a machinist and spent the rest of his life in this building. His daughter, Vina, lived here as well while she was principal of Seneca Falls First Ward School (c. 1894). The home remained in the Deming family until Vina's death in the mid-1940's. 21. SOURCES:

A 1911 Sanborn Map indicates that the factory included three rooms, used respectively for auto glue, printing, and stock, which were connected to a large brick structure which included a small frame room with a skylight. There was also a detached, L-shaped brick structure to the rear which was used for sign painting.

The revisions to a 1929 Sanborn Map indicate that by 1955, the structure was greatly enlarged. Another brick building was attached to the rear of the front three rooms. A part of the vacant L-shaped structure was removed and a large rectangular cinder block structure was attached to the remaining building. Between this new cinder block and the initial rectangular structure facing Fall Street, a brick infill structure was constructed. A wooden staircase was added to the west facade and a small frame structure was added to the east facade. The skylight was taken down from the frame structure at the rear of the building. The sign painting shop was converted to a dry cleaning shop.

By 1902, the National Yeast Company had vacated the building on Fall Street and the structure was adapted for a new use. It became a factory which manufactured a luxury car known as the Iroquois Motor Car. This car, which was referred to as "the Rolls Royce" among cars of its day, was built by the hand-crafted techniques of carriage makers. In 1905, the first car, a 35 horse power engined vehicle, rolled out of the factory. By 1907, there were three models, the least expensive priced at \$2,500 (the average cost of a house of the time was \$500) and most expensive model priced at \$3,000.

The Iroquois Motor Company did not remain long on Fall Street. In 1910, the company failed and left Seneca Falls for Syracuse where the proprietors formed an auto-repair company. A deed of that year in the records of Seneca County (Liber 129, page 221) indicates that the property, including 197½' frontage and 170' rear space, a gasoline engine, elevator, operating apparatus, pulleys and shaftings connected with the gasoline engine, was transferred to the Seneca Falls Folding Box Company.

The building changed hands again in 1928 when Fred L. Huntington acquired it and converted it into an auto-garage (Liber 155, page 495). (see bottom)





Chamberlain, organizer of the Phoenix Woolen Mills, president of the Seneca Falls Savings Bank and a former New York State Assemblyman. The Crowell/Curtis house does not exist on the 1911 Sanborn map, but is represented on the 1925 revision. The directory of 1914-15 lists the building as a duplex. The lot is immediately adjacent to the McClary/Chamberlain House and formed part of the McClary land holdings. John Crowell, a grocer and meat market owner, resided at #204, while John Curtis, a sign painter, lived at #206 with his sister Cora, who was a Western Union telegraph operator. It forms part of a group of several Colonial Revival residences at Eastern Fall St., but is varied by Shingle style treatment of surfaces and details. Some shingles are cut in ornamental patterns and all the pedimented gables. The home is interesting in its representation of a stylistic transition.

#### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Some time shortly after 1910, additional apartment units were added on the north side of the building and from that time up to the present, the building has listed occupancy of four residential units. Other long-term residents include Bessie and R.J. Fisher, from c. 1935 to c. 1955, and F.J. Selley, from c. 1954 to c. 1973.

While the Lane house was not the earliest sited on Fall Street, it may be earliest in construction. The land was held originally by the McClary family.



## 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE:

According to one source, he and Daniel Moran, a prominent Seneca Falls attorney headed a group who went about the county selling bonds. During their rallies, "Dan would talk and Harrywould sing." He and his wife Katherine Maier Belcher had one child who died in infancy. Dr. Belcher's offices were located in the Clary Building. In 1927, his poor eye sight forced him to retire.

In 1945, Harry Belcher died and Harry Nothnagle, his next-door neighbor inherited the property. He sold the house to Maynard Brown that same year. The present owners, Roger and Carol Simolo, bought the house in 1978.



The Steen House appears on the 1873 Bird's eye perspective, but is not listed in the 1862-63 directory, therefore the approximate date of construction. The first resident was Mary Steen, a domestic, and her husband, through 1894. She was followed by George Daniels, a shoemaker with Daniels and Company through about 1900, and then William G. Allen until 1915, a mechanical engineer. Exemplifying the Italianate style, the house seems formally balanced with wide eaves, tall first floor windows, a low pitched hip roof, cupola, heavy fenestration moldings, and a porch confined to the length of the house. The site is at the western edge of land held by G.H. McClary in the 1830's-1860's. While not elaborate or stylistically interpretive, this straightforward dwelling represents one of the least altered Italianates on Fall Street.



According to a Seneca Falls directory of 1894, Sylvester Pew (who was born in Ithacain 1820) was a printer who published in Seneca Falls and Waterloo between 1841 and 1875. His paper, the Seneca County Courier, appeared every Thursday and his offices were in the Phoenix Block on Fall Street. Liber 86, Page 111 indicates that a lot worth \$3,100 was transferred to Sylvester Pew from Marvin Pew in 1873. 



The building is not shown on the 1873 Bird's Eye View but is listed in the 1889 Village Directory. Perry Van Kleeck was born in 1837 in Danby, Tompkins County, New York and married in Seneca Falls. For many years he was a druggist and pharmacist at 130-132 Fall Street (corner of State). His son, James (born in 1877) attended Hobart College in Geneva, New York in the late nineteenth century. Perry Van Kleeck and family resided and owned 232 Fall Street from C. 1889 to C. 1926. By 1935 this large Second Empire residence had undergone subdivision, being converted from a one family to a four family dwelling.

HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Although no becord was found which clearly indicated the date of constuction of the brick structure at 223-225 Fall Street, a title search indicated that the structure may have been built prior to 1824. Liber Q81 Page 448 of the records of Seneca County mentions a transaction between Abraham Payne and Elisha Payne in 1824 for "premises and appurtenances" on a tract of land (part of Military Tract 100). A subsequent deed in Liber Y, Page 577 describes a transaction between Abraham Payne and Nathan Farnsworth in 1832 for the sum of \$3,175.57. Although the sum involved in the transaction has decreased, this deed is perhaps significant since it specifically mentions the existance of a brick dwelling on the plot of land. #### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Doctor Farnsworth working in Seneca Falls in 1823 who may have been the latter party involved in the previous described transaction.

Apparently, Nathan Farnsworth sold the property to Wakeman Burr, since Liber  $E^2$  Page 393 describes a transaction between the two parties for "62 acres of land with estate" in 1836. Although this title does not specifically mention the brick house, the amount of the transaction is substantial (\$4,000), which suggests that the structure was included.

A deed in Liber  $W^2$  Page 307 concerns the transfer of a tract of land between Wakeman Burr and Hiram Heath for \$4,500 in 1850. Once again, the house is not specifically mentioned, but the sum involved is substantial. The date of this transaction is also consistent with that indicated in an article about the Heath family which appeared in the Papers Presented to the Historical Society of Seneca Falls in 1907. This article provides an excellent biographical sketch of Hiram Heath, a prominent physician who practiced for almost fifty years in Seneca Falls.

According to this paper, Hiram Heath was born in Harpersfield, New York in 1802. His ancestors included Bartholomew, Isaac, and William Heath, who came to America in the 1630's. His early life was spent in the vicinity of Ithaca, New York. In 1827, he married Clarissa Barnaby, a lineal descendent of Richard Warren, who came to America on the Mayflower. After studying medicine in Fairfield, New York, he came to Seneca Falls, where in 1838 he entered into a partnership with Dr. E.G. Williams. This partnership lasted three to four years. By 1842, he had established his own practice and was noted as one of the first physicians to practice homeopathy. He was active in the community; a member of the Methodist Church and the Masons. He had eight children: Dr. Delos L., Edwin H., Marcus W., Justina R., Augustus C., Don F., Edwin H., Ella B. The oldest of the children, Delos, was also noted for his work in medicine, especially during the Civil War, when he served as a physician in the Union Army. As part of the 17th Michigan Infantry (he had studied medicine at the University of Michigan), he was a member of Burnside's expedition to the East. His regiment joined Sherman at Red Clay, Georgia, where he engaged in a battle in the campaign to Atlanta. He was within a few feet of General McPherson when the general was killed. After the Civil War, Delos returned (c. 1887) to Seneca Falls, where he practiced until he died in 1903.

In 1891, Hiram Heath moved to Louisa, Virginia. A deed inLiber 109 Page 363 indicates that Hiram and Clarissa Heath willed "4 large village lots and a large brick barn and shop subject to a mortgage with Ithaca Savings Bank for \$3,000) to Justina Heath of Washington, D.C. in that same year. Apparently Justina and Mary Heath were responsible for the subdivision of the Heath land which led to the establishment of a number of other residences on Fall Street.

## 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE:

In 1907, the property was conveyed to Francis E. Eldridge. In 1920, George and Amanda Beach acquired the property. George Beach was a lumber dealer. Myron Doty was the subsequent owner of the property in 1922. In 1935, Dr. Vincent Hamill bought the house. According to the present owner, he subdivided the interior of the house in order to use it as both his house and office. In 1951, the present owner, Donald Siegfried bought the property. In 1953, a fire burned the back part of the house. At some point, a carriage house attached to the rear of the house was converted into a garage and maid's quarters. The present owners converted this section into apartments during the 1950's. In 1954, a cinderblock garage was built in the back of the house.


The Hopkins House possesses details typifying the Italian Villa style. These include broad eaves, a cornice consisting of paired cyma-curved brackets, a cupola of vertical proportions emphasized by round-arched windows, and elongated windows at the south facade. The residence is shown in a 1904 photograph from Grip's "Historical Souvenir of Seneca Falls", with a much broader lawn bounded by a dense line of trees at the earlier and narrow street, which was not yet paved. Beyond the later elaborate porch, the Hopkins House seems of unusually pure Italianate proportions, thus seeming individual and important on Fall St.

This Classical Revival frame structure is architecturally unique in Seneca Falls. Although there is no record of when the house was constructed, the house does not appear on a 1896 map of Seneca Falls. However, the house does appear on a 1911 Sanborn Map. Deed 121, page 37 of the records of Seneca County describes a transaction between Theodosia M. Moran and Justina Heathina in 1902 which involves a parcel of land that is most likely the site of the present house. According to Mrs. Floyd Collins, who was on the staff of the Seneca Falls Reveille, there is an article which appeared in a 1906 edition of the paper which describes the construction-in-progress of the house.

clapboarding is intact. 12 over 1 sash windows are used throughout; the lintel moldings on the second floor windows break the cornice line. Abutting the central block and the wing on the west elevation is a Colonial Revival porch with attenuated columns and a wide cornice. An enclosed chimney pierces the gable roof on the west side.

The dining room retains its original architectural integrity including the hardwood beams across the ceiling and the hardwood sliding doors with beveled glass between the living and dining rooms.

born in Waterloo, NY, on April 15, 1869 and attended Cornell University. He was admitted to the bar in 1892 and subsequently went to Salt Lake City, Utah, and later to New York City. When he returned to Seneca FAlls during the late 1890's, he established offices in the Cleary Building. He was a police magistrate from 1897 to 1898, the District Attorney for Seneca County from 1899 to 1901, a member of the New York State legislature from 1902 to 1903. Liber 175, page 330, indicates that the property was purchased by William and Marguerite Murphy, antique dealers, in 1938. Bernt L. Andersen and Erna S. Andersen acquired the property in 1963. They remodelled all of the interior rooms except for the dining room. The present owners, George and Joanne Elyseev, bought the house in August, 1976.



Hood Railroad Coal Yards at the New York Central Tracks, a major facility between Syracuse and Rochester. His sister, Theresa Palmer built the Phoenix Block in Seneca Falls.

Ajah R. Palmer resided at 228 West Fall St. from c. 1890 until his death in November of 1924. His wife, Mrs. Lillian Palmer continued to live at this address until the early 1940's. By 1927 the house had been subdivided into two apartment units and Walter J. Brainerd is listed a long term occupant between c. 1935 and 1961. Change in owners and tenants has progressed more rapidly since that time.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The structure does not appear on the 1896 map of Seneca Falls, but does appear on the 1911 Sanborn map. Apparently the structure stands on a sub-division of a tract of land sold to Josiah T. Miller by the Heath family in 1892 (Liber 124, Page 173). This transaction for \$4,500 included a "tenant house" located at the edge of Fall Street. This tenant house was apparently demolished, since there is no indication of the structure on the 1911 Sanborn map. Liber 124, Page 372 contains a deed for the transfer of the land to G.B. Beach in 1905. A deed in Liber 133, Page 338, indicates that Rush S. Allen purchased the property in 1909. 


Detail of front porch







Windows are typically one over one double hung wood sash with plain casements and molded caps (tangent to the freize at the second story). Centered on the major front gable is an oriel, while centered on the right (west) wide gable is a two-story bay window with twelve over one double hung sash, and paneled dividers. On the east side, this entire gable projects forming a pavilion. The west façade also features a slightly projecting, mid-level, window with gable roof and decoratively shingled base. The main entry is covered by a hipped roof porch with delicate fretwork, unusual turned posts and rail with turned balusters. The building's foundation is rock-faced limestone.



20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This building adds to the integrity and the scale of the streetscape.

This house and the earlier residence at 10 Johnston Street were built by Charles L. Story who was born in Waterloo, NY in 1839. His business at 79 Fall Street offered a complete line of groceries, provisions and farm seeds. His father, Lewis, was from Saratoga County, NY. He settled in Waterloo, NY in 1829. It appears that this house served as a rental property for the Story family who continued to maintain their residency at #10 Johnston Street located immediately across the street. George P. Rogers owned the house during the 1902's and 30's. During the 40's and 50's Frank P. Page resided at 10 Johnston Street and since that time a number of owner/occupants have lived at this address.

Eliza Holton, widow of Simeon Holton, bought this house from J. C. Woodworth in May 1872. (1) Her husband had died in February of the same year. Simeon Holton had been born in Romulus, NY in 1826, one of thirteen children. From a young age he worked as a blacksmith in the summers and went to school in the winter. He began teaching in Southern Seneca County, and in 1851-1852, came to Seneca Falls to teach. He also began to read law with Stephan S. Yiele. He was admitted to the bar in 1853.(2) During this period (1851-53), he acted as principal of the Seneca Falls Academy.(3) He practiced law and was a justice of the peace.(4) In 1866 he became editor of the <u>Seneca County Cour ier</u>, which he owned with Sylvester Pew.(5) During this period, Holton was also a member of the first Board of Education (1867-71)(6), and acted as post-master from 1868-71.(7)

Holton was also an officer of the Seneca County Agricultural Society. (8) He and his wife attended Trinity Episcopal Church. (9) The Seneca Falls Republican Club was another of his activities (10), as was his membership in the Seneca Falls Mens Literary Association. (11)

Holton married his wife Eliza in 1856, and they had two children. All three survived him when he died in 1872.(12)

In 1902, Eliza Holton sold the property to Anna Holton. Charles L. Story bought it from her in 1916, who left it to Fred Story when he died in 1920. Fred Story owned it untill 1949, when his estate sold it to Bradford and Jean Miller. The Millers lived there until 1960, when they sold it to Paul and Lucille Cummings. They in turn transferred the land in 1972 to Norman and Sandra Wolfe. (13)



alone; several years later, financial reverses caused him to close the business. He became a travelling salesman, working first for Rumsey and Co. and later for the Rising Sun Yeast Co. He retired in 1890.

Woodworth had married Caroline A. Miller in 1850. They had four children, Clara A. (1851-95), Carrie M. (1859-94), Chauncey W. (d. 1883), and Jessie (d. 1886). After his first wife died, Woodworth married her sister Edna A. Miller, in 1865. Their children were Elmer J. (b. 1867), Jennie Mae, Grace A., and Edith G.

Woodworth was a member of the Seneca Falls Presbyterian Church. He also was active in the Republican Club and the Men's Literary Association.

In 1865, Woodworth bought a large lot on the south side of Johnston St. from Alexander M. VanCleef. He lived there, and gradually sold off the land in smaller lots. This lot was part of that large lot.

Woodworth died in April 1906, and the land became his widow's.



Frank Warren added a new roof, dug the basement, remodelled the kitchen and bathroom, and built the garage. Frank's widow, Barbara continues to live in the house.







Several changes have been made to the original structure which have altered its historic character. While the house originally had an open porch on the east facade, the porch did not extend out slightly beyond the south facade as it currently does. The porch itself has therefore been rebuilt since it was shown on the 1925 Sanborn map with 1950 and 1959 updates in its old form. A one story frame addition on the west facade, with an entrance on the south facade, and an open porch on the west facade were also constructed after 1959. The second floor windows and entrance door on the east facade have been altered.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Charles G. Corwin bought the former Wesleyan Chapel and the lot at 7 Mynderse from the Wesleyan Methodist Society in October 1871. The Wesleyan Chapel was built in 1843, but the exact date of construction of this house is unclear.

Corwin was born in 1825 and lived on a farm at Magee's Corners in Tyre, N.Y. As an adult, he and his wife Helena owned and farmed 75 acres in Tyre. When he bought the Chapel, he moved to the village and went into business with Cyrus Garnsey; they sold hardware as "Garnsey & Corwin". Sometime after 1881, he retired from the partnership, but continued to sell agricultural implements and equipment. He died of a stroke in January 1886.

In fact, Wesleyan Methodist Society records indicate that Charles Corwin was a trustee of the church from 1859-1873, and a very generous donor to the church. Aside from the \$5,000 he paid for the actual chapel building and grounds, he donated \$1,000, some of it in-kind from his business, to the effort at a new church in 1870.

Corwin did not own the lot or the chapel for long. He sold the whole package to William Johnson in July 1872, and the Chapel was remodeled into the Johnson Opera House.


Johnson transferred the entire property to Emmett and Sarah Ryan. In 1913, the Ryans sold it to the Seneca Falls Opera House Company. The Company owned it for a year, but then sold it to Fred and Harriet Fisher in 1914. Mr. and Mrs. Fisher both died late in 1930 and their heirs owned the property until 1948, when it was sold to Clinton and Ira Young. The Youngs sold the property to the Village of Seneca Falls in 1960. In 1961, the village transferred the property to Oliver and Adelyne Acheson. (The property included #128-130-132 Fall Street and 7 Mynderse, through all these sales). The Achesons sold the land and buildings to Conrad Zurich and Ronald Ungever in 1966, and in 1968, Ungever sold his interest to the current sole owner, Conrad Zurich.

This building, although in need of repair and maintenance, retains much of its original fabric, styling and configuration. To be sure, it is not highly styled, but instead rather plain and undecorated. It was built later than the other homes on the street and is different in style and scale.

land worth \$650 and five acres in the village worth \$150. (Joseph Metcalf owned 87 acres and a house worth \$1,218.)

Jonathan Metcalf turned the five acre plot in Seneca Falls into a fortune. In 1832, 1833, and 1834, he hired the surveyor John Burton to draw maps of the land and divide it into residential-size lots. He then entered into successive partnerships with William Bruce, Levi Rogers, and Abraham Payne between 1832 and 1834, in order to sell off the lots into which the piece of land had been divided. Interestingly, Metcalf sold many of these lots in blocks to members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which he was a leader. This particular lot, 9 Mynderse, was kept by Metcalf in the original 1833 partition of the lots, and he is listed as the owner on the 1856 French map of Seneca Falls. The house was apparently used as a parsonage for the Wesleyan Methodist Church in the 1860's.

As mentioned above, Metcalf was a leader of the Methodist Church, and apparently broke away from that church to join the Wesleyan Methodist Church in 1843. This split in the congregation was over the issue of slavery. He is mentioned in church records as having attended quarterly conferences in 1832 on behalf of the congregation. However, Metcalf seems to have been a convert to Methodism, since he was one of the original trustees of the first Baptist Society in 1828.

Politically, Metcalf was described as a "leading Republican", early in the history of Seneca County. He also attended the first Women's Rights Convention in 1848 and was a signer of the Declaration of Sentiments.

It is not clear when, but some time shortly before 1860, Metcalf and his family moved to Michigan. His interest in real estate in Seneca Falls was turned over to his brother, Joseph, who continued to sell off the property well into the 1860's.



#### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

1867 and 1881 directories give the same information about George Milk. (David Milk died July 20, 1873.) By 1888, however, only George's widow, Caroline, is listed as an occupant of the house. In July 1901, she sold the property for \$900.

Extensive exterior remodeling have diminished this building's integrity. Some original fabric of particular note survives (i.e. verge board and finial). In any case, the house maintains the rhythm and scale of the original street-scape.





The right-of-center main entry, in the west façade, is an elaborate entry surround, with decorated paneled pilasters, supporting a modest entablature. The door is flanked by three over nine sidelights. A porch with Queen Anne style turned posts wraps from this entry to the side entry, with a diagonal at the cornice. As a whole, this building forms a very interesting combination: Greek Revival from the main (west) façade; Federal from the side, and linked by a Queen Anne porch.

Between 1886 and 1911, a rear, one story addition was raised to two stories, and later a small hipped roof entry cover supported by brackets with finials. Another one story addition was added to the rear after 1911.

In 1850, Stockman and his family were boarding with Scherezade Van Aelstyne and eight members of her family. With Stockman, who was born in 1807, were his wife, Harriet (b. 1800) and their two children, Eliza (b. 1836) and Sidney (b. 1833). That year, Stockman was worth \$3,000. The 1851 tax assessment roll indicates that Stockman owned a house on State Street, a house on Mynderse Street, and a house on Ovid Street. The 1856 map indicates that Stockman's house on State Street was directly adjacent to 18 Mynderse Street, and that Mrs.Van Aelstyne was the occupant of the Mynderse Street house. Stockman's relationship to Mrs. Van Aelstyne is unknown, but it is quite possible that she and her family lived with Stockman until the house he was building on Mynderse Street was completed. Stockman is last listed in the 1881 directory, when he is running a grocery store and living on Daniels Street in the village.

This new company used the first steam-powered engine and made the first iron pumps in the village. Briggs left the firm in 1845 and Washburn Race joined in 1846. # 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Silsby and Edward Mynderse bought his interest, and the firm became Downs, Mynderse, and Company. In 1851, Mynderse sold out to Seabury Gould, and the firm was called Downs, Silsby, and Gould. Downs and Gould later bought out Silsby, and called themselves Downs and Company.

In the eleven years since 1840, the firm had acquired capitol of \$40,000, and employed nearly 100 men. By 1860, the firm was worth \$200,000 and employed 230 people.

Downs was quite young when he entered the pump business; he was born in 1819. He lived in the village with his wife, Ann (b. 1821), and their children, Josephine (b. 1838), William (b. 1847), and Cora (b. 1850). He was an officer of the Hyperion Lodge of the Odd Fellows Society.

He owned this and other pieces of rental property for several years.



and later, the first iron pump. After only two years, Smith Briggs sold out his interest in the firm, which became Wheeler & Downs.

Smith Briggs was also a founding member of Rescue Engine Company #3, a Seneca Falls fireman's group, in 1842. It is not clear what happened to Briggs after he sold out of his business in 1845, but he does not appear in the 1850 census or in the 1862 and subsequent directories. It is likely that he moved from the village sometime between 1845 and 1850. Although altered, the house maintains the regularity and rhythm of the street scape.

The 1851 tax assessment roll indicates that Lorenzo Baker owns one house worth \$300.00 and a new house worth \$300.00. Since Lorenzo Baker bought another lot when he bought 40 Mynderse, it is likely that he built a new house for himself on the other lot, and lived with his family until his house was completed.

Francis M. Baker is listed as the owner of the house in the 1862 directory; he is the foreman at the Courier printing office. H.H. Baker, a carpenter, boards with him. Francis Baker also published a short-lived monthly local/historical journal called the Seneca Sachem in 1863. In the 1867 directory, the only entry is for Mary E. Baker, a dress and cloak-maker residing on Fall Street. She was probably Lorenzo's daughter.

A monumental procession of marble and square tiled (diagonally set, grey and white checkerboard pattern) floors and a butterfly stairway with brass railings lead to the third floor entrance of the auditorium. The auditorium is highlighted with classical motifs over the stage, six original chandeliers, original wooden seats with the insignia MA on the aisle seats, and a balcony. Original wood floors exist in the classrooms.

#### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The inability of the park to serve as a central space was assured when in the early 1840's, the railroad built through Seneca Falls bisected the park.

Wilhelmus Mynderse, one of the founding fathers of Seneca Falls, was born in Albany, New York on July 11, 1767, and came to Seneca Falls in 1795 as the agent of the Bayard Land Company of Albany. By 1809, Col. Mynderse had purchased 1,450 acres of land in Seneca Falls on both sides of the river and had control of all the water power in the village. Much of the land on which Seneca Falls was built was owned by the Bayard Company. The site of the village park was a gift from Mynderse, as was the site of the Academy.

Construction began in 1833 and was nearly completed at a cost of \$1,666. At a July 1833 meeting the Trustees decided that \$508 in subscriptions, yet to be collected, were to be utilized to finish the building and improve the grounds. The two-story building was a brick structure, 32' x 50' in dimension. It opened in the fall of 1833 with Cotton M. Crittenden as its first principal.

In 1837, the name of Mynderse Academy was changed to Seneca Falls Academy through a petition to the Regents of the State of New York. With the growth of the public school system prior to the Civil War, the prosperity of the Academy began to decline. During the War, the Academy suffered financial failure.

In 1867 the legislature enacted a law creating an enlarged educational district by consolidation of several common school districts. From the passage of the 1867 Act the Board of Education leased the Academy building from the Board

of Trustees, for the high school of the District, which was known as the Seneca Falls High School. The Trustees dissolved themselves and gave the school building to the Board of Education to allow for construction of a new building in 1885.

In September of 1885, the demolition of the old brick building began in order to build a new public school on the site. A formal application was again made to the Board of Regents to change the name of the Seneca Falls High School to Mynderse Academy in December. The new building was completed in the summer of 1886.

By 1923, the third Mynderse Academy building proved to be inadequate and the present building was proposed. One of the first difficulties was the selection of a proper site. State officials initially proposed a large site outside the village. Local officials held that the new school should use at least in part the land upon which the Academy then stood. The new structure was built next to the old Academy, partly on the site of houses built in the third and fourth decades of the 19th century. The site was changed by closing North Park Street from where the school began. The purpose was to merge the school grounds with the Village Park. This allowed for a more spacious site.

The architectural firm of Tooker and March was employed by the Board of Education for the project. Tooker and March was a partnership established in 1913 between E. Post Tooker and Reginald E. March. Mr. Tooker graduated from Lehigh University in 1907, and Mr. March graduated from Cornell University in 1906.

The firm was well represented in architecture and business associations of New York City, members of the New York Building Congress and the Architectural League of New York. Mr. Marsh was a member of the Rotary Club of New York under the classification "School Architect." Their work covered a large area and included schools, banks, hospitals, club houses, automobile sales and service buildings, and residences. They specialized, however, in school work. Records of the State Department of Education showed that during the five years prior to the construction of the Seneca Falls school their school work included more buildings, involving a greater expenditure of money, than any other three architects combined (excluding work in cities in the "first class" category).

On February 12, 1926, Dr. F. D. Boynton, Superintendent of Schools in Ithaca, NY delivered the dedicatory address at the Mynderse Academy building.

The surroundings changed dramatically in the post World War II period. The school district had acquired the Greek Revival-style Partridge House to the west of the village park along Cayuga Street. After using the building for home economics classes for several years, the Board demolished the building, de facto changing the shape of the village park from rectangular to L-shaped, with the school building at the turning point of the L.

In the mid- 1950s, the school district built a new high school north of the subject building, at the edge of development in Seneca Falls and adjoining the existing football field. Later a wing to the new high school, also called Mynderse Academy, was built, expanding the new building into a junior-senior high school and the subject building became known as the Intermediate School

The structure ceased to function as a school in June 1982, as declining enrollment led to consolidation at the newer building. In 1985 the School Board renamed the building Academy Square, marking a transition in use from school age children to a home for Board of Education offices, a day care center, mental health outpatient services, and job training programs. In 1988, the building was sold to the present owner.





The structure does not appear on a 1911 Sanborn map. It does appear on a 1929 (with 1955 revisions) Sanborn map. According to deed records of Seneca County, R. Leo Flanagan acquired the land from S. Agnes Casey in 1911. Liber 149, page 373 contains a recording of a transaction between William J. and Ceilia F. Mackin and R. Leo Flanagan in 1923. From approximately 1935 until the mid-1970s, William and Mary Mackin owned this property. The present owner; Alma L.Smith acquired the property in 1979. 

Seneca Falls Academy. John Edwards was rather frail, and devoted himself to teaching school, both in Seneca Falls and in surrounding towns. While teaching south of Seneca Falls, he fell in love with and married one of his pupils, Martha Allen. They bought a house on the Ovid Road. They had two children, both of whom died in infancy. Shortly thereafter, they moved into the village and lived first on State Street, then on Prospect Street.

Martha Edwards died in November 1877. Ten years later, John Edwards was remarried to his lifelong friend Asenath Burroughs. In 1890, they moved to Michigan, where they lived until Edward's death at 89 in March 1916.

Edward's had been prosperous, but not spectacularly so. He began as a farmer with his father, later engaged in the lumber business with Fred Maier, and subsequently owned a sashand blind factory on lower Fall Street.

Edwards was a devoted member of the First Presbyterian Church in Seneca Falls, and also a member of the local Republican Club.

Subsequent owners of the property have been: Matilda and John Yury in 1888, and Louise and Francis Shannon in 1935. Louise Shannon is the current owner.



In 1910, William and Grace Yawger Maier bought 60 Cayuga, and had the house at 5 prospect built.	,
William J. Maier was born in Seneca Falls in 1876, the son of Joseph G Maier (b1836 in Germany) and Mary A. Maier. Joseph Maier and another German immigrant, Henry George, ran a butcher shop on Fall St. William Maier was well educated, being sent to college and law school. By 1900, he was practicing law. He married Grace Yawger and took a job as a bond salesman between 1900 and 1906.

They lived in the house at 60 Cayuga Street for about four years before they actually bought it.

By 1914, Maier had been elected a member of the New York State Assembly. That job led to a position as deputy state comptroller, which he had by 1921. After many years of public service, Maier returned to Seneca Falls, but kept his business interests in New York City.

The family was active in the First Presbyterian Church, where Grace Maier was an officer of the King's Daughter's Society.

William Maier died some time between 1939-47. His widow continued to live in the house until well into the 1960's.

The house was built by William Maier between 1910 and 1915. In 1915, the property was sold to Jennie D. Lormore. She operated it as a rental property. (Among the tenants were Wetmore H. Titus, Frank M. Knight, and Howard J. Taylor). Boyd and Dorthy Pond bought the property from Lormore, and they sold it in 1947 to the current owners Roland and Marion Bentley.



20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The land on which 7 Prospect St. stands was originally part of a large tract which included all the land bounded on the west by Cayuga St., on the north by Johnston St., on the south by Prospect St., and on the east by the New York Central railroad tracks. This parcel was sold by Alexander M. and Jane C. VanCleef to J.C. Woodworth on June 1, 1865 for \$8000.00 (deed 71-490). In 1878, Woodworth lost the land to Willis T. Seymour in a mortgage foreclosure; Seymour paid \$5780 for the land (93-183). On January 16, 1882 Seymour sold the land to Warren J. Chathorn (96-361), who in turn sold it to G.P. Rogers for \$8000.00 on Dec. 27, 1888 (106-56).

Rogers sold this particular parcel to Frances A. Knapp on Dec. 22, 1894 (113-254) for \$2721.40. Sometime after 1896, Mrs. Knapp built this house and resided in it. Subsequent occupants of the house include: L. Roy & Sarah VanEtten, Robert P. & 21. SOURCES: Alma Mills, and Herbert Dickson, Jr.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Aluminum siding covers the building and diminishes the building's architectural interest. Some original features are retained (i.e. porch and window sash). Porch in need of repair.
James Squires bought 8 Prospect St. from Ellen and David Lum in April 1865. The purchase price indicates that there was a house on the lot; the 1871 map confirms that the house belonged to a "Mrs. Squires".
It is likely that James Squires died sometime between 1865 and 1871, otherwise, the house would have been listed in his name on the 1871 map. Further, James Squires is not listed in existing directories (1862, 1867, 1881, 1884, etc). The only record that remains of James Squires is that he married Elisa Caine 21. SOURCES: (continued)

in the M.E. Church in November 1857. This is surprising, since James Squires had joined the First Presbyterian Church in 1831 and been chosen a ruling elder in 1844. He must have changed his religious affiliation at some point.

His wife was probably not listedbecause she had no business or profession. It is clear that she continued to live at 8 Prospect from a passing reference in a 1948 Seneca Falls Historic Society paper. There it is made clear that a Mrs. Squires shared her house with the wodow of Dr. Joseph Brown, one of the earliest druggists in the village.

The house was sold about 1900 to J.S. Edward who lived next door and used the property for rental income. In 1909, he sold it to Alice Bocker, who occupied it until 1969, when her executors sold it to Duane Coffin. Coffin owned the property for two years, and rented it to Mrs. Helen Bishop, who bought it from him in 1971. Subsequently, she sold it to Mary Belle Lutz.

The same month, Dr. Belcher, a dentist, was registered to practice in Seneca Falls by the County Clerk. He was 26. William Belcher practiced briefly with his brother Harry L. Belcher, but then left Seneca Falls for Rochester. In Rochester, he was prominent in various activities for the advancement of his profession, particularly in the areas of oral hygiene and children's dentistry. Later in his life, he became editor of a leading dental journal, Oral Hygiene. He died in Rochester in 1919, leaving a widow, Alice and a son, Harold.

Among subsequent owners of the property were Myra E. Viele, Charles L. Brown, Robert L. Kaye, S.J. Velarde Jr., and Daniel & Carolyn Roll.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

Older home, extensively altered. Little to no archetectural significance. Helps maintain scale of street scape.

James Squires VanCleef bought the house at 10 Prospect St. from Ellen Lum in April 1866. She was a widow. Her husband, George Cunningham VanCleef, was the son of Lawrence and Sally VanCleef, who were among the first white settlers in Seneca Falls. In fact, George VanCleef was the first white male child born in the village in April 1797. Joanna VanCleef's father, Nicholas Squires, had come to Seneca Falls in 1802, when she (6 Sept. 1795) was seven years old.

After Joanna and George VanCleef married, they had thirteen children. They lived on the VanCleef family farm on the Auburn Road north of the village. 21. SOURCES:

In 1829, they owned 374 acres, but in 1851 she owned 137 acres of land. George VanCleef died in December 1844. Joanna continued to live on the family farm and raise her children. In 1850, only three of them were still at home: Euphania (b. 1831), Edward, a farmer, (b. 1834), and Julia (b. 1840). Wesley Calhoun, a farmerhand, also lived with the family. That year Joanna VanCleef's land was worth \$6850.00, and she personally was worth a total of \$9000.00.

In 1866, after her children were all grown, Joanna VanCleef moved into the village. She continued to live on Prospect Street until her death in August 1884. When she died, she left the house to Mary Euphania VanCleef. The property remained in the family until 1920, when it was sold to Edwin and Mildred Perhius. The Perhius' sold the property to Jane and Luther Glantz in 1949. Luther glantz died in 1951, but Jane glantz lived in the house until 1956, when it was purchased by E. Belmont and Clarabelle Stewart. In 1976, the house was sold to Victor and Elaine Hooper.

The house at 11 Prospect Street was purchased by William H. and Clara Sanderson in July 1895. William Sanderson was the son of James Sanderson Jr., and Charlotte McGraw Sanderson, who had married at McGrawville, NY in 1846. William and his sister Louise G. were born in Cortland, NY c. 1854-55, while another brother, Charles was born in Seneca Falls in 1856.

William Sanderson's father had been raised in Seneca Falls, but had left as a young man. He returned with his wife and family in 1856 and opened a cabinet-making shop and an undertaking parlor. In 1885, his sons, William and Charles, bought his firm. In 1890, the great fire destroyed their business, so they dissolved the partnership. William Sanderson continued the cabinetmaking and furniture business, while Charles continued as an undertaker.

house worth \$700.00 on Clinton Street. They had two sons, one of whom was Mynderse VanCleef, later a prominent lawyer.

In the 1850's, VanCleef bought the Lower Red Mills and a distillery in partnership with George B. Daniels. When the factory burned in 1862, they sold out to John P. Cowing. After 1862, VanCleef began work as a collector for the Internal Revenue Service. Sometime after 1867, VanCleef moved to Ithaca, NY, where he died in August 1879.

During their stay in Seneca Falls, the VanCleefs were active in village society. Alexander VanCleef was one of the many prominent businessmen who congregated at Charles Hoskins' dry goods store, and made it a center of village life. He was also active in the local agricultural society, in the Republican Club, and in the Literary Association.

VanCleef Street is named after Alexander M. VanCleef.

Subsequent owners of the house have been John L. Paine in 1870, P. Coff, T.J. Yawger, Oscar and Anna Gower in 1928, Virgie and Sadie VanHorn in 1951, and Rubin and Jennie Grabbatin in 1955.





bankrupt company had to sell off its assets. Caroline and Albert Cook were the grantees.

A house at 1 Seneca Street appears on the 1856 map; it was almost certainly built by the Bayard Brothers. None of the previous owners of the house and lot actually occupied it.

Albert Cook was born in 1823 in Cortland, New York. He grew up there and became a local shopkeeper. But as a young man, he moved to Seneca Falls and went to work for the merchant Erastus Partridge. His wife, Caroline Partridge Cook, (b. 1824) was Erastus Partridge's daughter. They were married in 1847 and had three children: Emma (1849-68), Charles (1868-76), and Adelaide (1860-1933). After his marriage, Patridge opened a business in Wolcott, NY until the end of the war; at that time he moved to Lockport, NY and opened another store.

When the First National Bank of Seneca Falls was incorporated in 1862, Albert Cook was a founding member of the board of directors. In August 1873, after the death of Mr. Partridge, he returned to Seneca Falls and became vice-president of the First National Bank. In 1876, he became president. He was named executor of his father-in-law's estate, the largest one ever settled in Seneca County.

The First National Bank closed in 1880, but the business continued as the Partridge Banking House. Mr. Cook bought this entirely in 1882 and ran it for the rest of his life.

He died, at 62, in October 1885. His wife Caroline sold the property to Rumsey & Co., Ltd. the day he died. They owned the property and rented it out until 1913, when they sold it to Arminda Durling. She left it to her son Stephen, who lived there for many years, but eventually sold the property to Eugene C. Baldwin in 1968.

The current house on the property dates from about 1910. Precisely when the original structures on the property were removed is not known.

The house at 11 Seneca Street is built on land that was once part of a much larger parcel, which changed hands several times. Among the previous owners were Albert Cook and Josiah and Augusta Miller, all wealthy landowners. Precisely when the house was built is not known, but it appears on the 1871 map of the village.

Augusta Miller sold the property to James F. and John P. Gilmore on 12/16/1890. (108-200). The Gilmores were prominent members of Seneca Falls' growing Irish-American community; their father, James Gilmore, had been born in Ireland in 1818 and lived in Seneca Falls since at least 1850. He died c. 1890.

James and John Gilmore sold the house to Julia E. Gilmore June 8, 1901 (120-408); it is likely that she was their sister, though this cannot be definitely proved. 21. SOURCES:


Julia Gilmore sold the home to John and Catherine McKeon on December 10, 1901 (120-511) for \$200.00. Almost immediately, McKeon sold it to Thomas Brady January 15, 1902 (119-291), who resided there for many years.

Thomas Brady's heirs sold his home after his death in 1927. The new owners were William and Ellen Hopper, September 27, 1927 (157-50). William Hopper was a machinist at Goulds Pumps for many years. His wife Ellen died in 1936, and he remarried Lillian Mary Hopper, probably in 1941. William Hopper died in 1965, and his widow sold the property to the County Commissioner of Social Services, February 23, 1965 (329-261).

On December 29, 1967, the house was sold to Thomas P. and Elizabeth A. Dowd for \$3600 (342-469). Members of the Dowd family still own the structure.






Detail of Main (West) Entry

Beginning in 1829, five generations of Sandersons have provided funeral services in Seneca Falls. After 147 years of serving the community, Sanderson Services, Inc. continues its good name and reputable business with Harold B. Sanderson as President.

In 1827 his great-grandfather came to the area from New Jersey and eventually settled here with his family in May of 1829. These were the days when the dead were laid in wood coffins made to order at the Cabinet Shop. Great grandfather Sanderson's business was located approximately where Gay & Sons is now.



Detail of Roof Cresting and Chimney



made possible by a beguest of \$2,000 from J.B. Johnson, in January 1909. The Andrew Carnegie Foundation contributed \$1,250, or half of the cost of \$2,500 for a new organ.

The First Congregational Church had the tallest spire (70 feet) in Seneca Falls. but the spire fell in a severe wind storm on February 26, 1928, without injury to anyone and without serious damage to the belfry, which housed the largest bells in Seneca County.

In 1955, a religious corporation was formed known as The Memorial Congregational Church of Seneca Falls. In 1962, an extensive renovation program was undertaken by parish members under the direction of Laurence Freeland. The roof was repaired by Swenson and Sons, the auditorium was varnished, the plaster ceiling painted. exterior iron railings added, and new front doors were hung. In 1971, the church was deeded to Service Agencies Center, Inc., due to a dwindling congregation and the cost of the upkeep of the property. Upon closing of the parish, the church organ was given to the Mynderse Senior High School.

On April 8, 1971, Service Agencies, Inc. took title to the church and the neighboring parsonage house for the use of non-profit charitable organizations. Currently, United Way, the Red Cross, and the House of Concern utilize the properties for their staff and programs.

He also converted it to a two family home. Since the early 1960's, when the Bancifort's purchased it, it has been used as residences.

20. load." The first freight shipped on the line was a load of mutton tallow, which traveled from Victor to Rochester.

At this time, the canal was the most safe, efficient, inexpensive way to travel or ship freight. In fact, the trains were shipped from Utica to Rochester along the canal. The coming of the railroad, however, pretty much heralded the end of the heyday of the canal. The train was much faster and much cheaper than the canal boats. Indeed, the Auburn and Rochester was renowned for its low fares: two cents per mile for passengers was charged.

The railroad continued to grow all through 1841. In September of that year, a bridge ACTOSS Cayuga Lake was completed, allowing train travel to Cayuga. In November, the line to Auburn was completed. There it connected with the Syracuse railroad.

The advent of the railroad was significant to the development of Seneca Falls' industries for several reasons. First, the railroad allowed local businesses to reach new markets to the west. Second, it was a very inexpensive and efficient way to ship goods. Finally, it enabled local business people to import a variety of new raw materials, which were processed in the hydro-powered factories along the river and the canal. Seneca Falls' industries diversified rapidly, growing beyond those products which could be

made from local raw materials.

The first station in Seneca Falls was a combination freight and passenger depot, with living quarters for the station agent. This building was located in the small triangular space north of the tracks on South Park Street.

In 1853, the Auburn-Rochester railroad was consolidated with other small, local railroads, into the New York Central. That same year, the separate passenger and freight depots were built, on opposite sides of State Street.

The building was used as a railroad freight station until 1958. The building was vacant from 1958-61; in 1961 Towers Associates bought the structure and renovated it. R.J Brown's Feed and Supply and Farmco were both long-time tenants of the building. In 1983, Dr. Fred Riegel bought the building and renovated it for use as professional offices.



20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: The coming of the railroad to Seneca Falls, like the rest of western New York State, was vital to its continued economic growth and industrial expansion. Chartered in 1836, the Rochester and Auburn Railroad laid down tracks in Seneca Falls in the winter of 1846-1841 enabling the first train to pass over the Seneca Falls road on July 5, 1841.
A large celebrating crowd was on hand to greet "the steam horse and his load." The first freight shipped on the line was a load of which traveled from Victor to Rochester.

to travel or ship freight. In fact, the trains were shipped from Utica to Rochester along the canal. The coming of the railroad, however, pretty much heralded the end of the heyday of the canal. The train was much faster and much cheaper than the canal boats. Indeed, the Auburn and Rochester was reknowned for it's low fares; 2 cents permile for passengers was charged.

The railroad continued to grow all through 1841. In September of that year, a bridge across Cayuga Lake was completed, allowing train travel to Cayuga. In November, the line to Auburn was completed. There, it connected with the Syracuse railroad.

The advent of the railroad was significant to the development of Seneca Falls' industries for several reasons. First, the railroad allowed local businesses to reach new markets to the west. Second, it was a very inexpensive and efficient way to ship goods. Finally, it enabled local business people to import a variety of new raw materials, which were processed in the hydropowered factories along the river and the canal. Seneca Falls' industries diversified rapidly, growing beyond those products which could be made from local raw materials.

The first station in Seneca Falls was a combination freight and passenger depot with living quarters for the station agent. This building was located in the small triangular space north of the tracks on South Park Street.

In 1853, Auburn-Rochester railroad was consolidated with other small, local railroads into the New York Central. That same year. the seperate passenger and freight depots were built on opposite sides of State Street.

### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

The passenger station was utilized until 1958, when passenger service to Seneca Falls was discontinued. The building was vacant for several years, and was bought in 1961 by Towers Associates. They made extensive changes to the building that year. The tenant until 1985 was Jemco Fool Company which manufactured two-man saws. In 1985 the Village of Seneca Falls bought the building for use as the Village Office building.







The railroad first came through Seneca Falls in 1841. The New York Central began its lines in 1853 and quickly built a small passenger and freight station with quarters for the station agent. This became inadequite, was removed, and the existing passenger station built c.1856 in the Romanesque Revival style.

As shown at the left, the structure has weathered numberous changes and additions, the most major occurring in 1961 when the interior was redone, the roof overhangs shortened, ornamental brackets removed, a new front door added, and a larger addition attached to the rear.





Barlow (of 67 State), homeowners during the nineteenth century, as trustees.





The lot on which the present and earlier building stood was donated to the church in 1817 by Colonel Mynderse, a very prominent citizen of Seneca Falls in the early 1800's. Church parsons had lived in the building from 1905.





20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: A previous house existed on the property, probably built by Alexander B. McGee, who purchased lots 46 and 47 (on John Burton's map of 1833) in 1852 for a total of \$600, then sold the combined properties to Robert Tate in 1853 for \$1,100. An L-shaped structure appears on the 1856 map, attributed to Tate's son-in-law, John Leach, and Tate's will of 1860 refers to "lots of land with buildings thereon." Leach's children sold the property to George Barlow in 1894 for \$2,600. Barlow tore down the L-shaped structure sometime after 1896, the last time it appears on a Sanborn map.
The present structure was built sometime after 1896, but by 1904, when it first appears on a Sanborn map. It was probably built by Barlow himself, a contractor and builder who did the masonry work on the Partridge Block of 1891. 21. stained glass windows framing the stairway on the north façade, and in each of the four gables, with bracketed end returns, are Palladian windows with "gothic" style tracery in the upper sashes and Doric pilaster surrounds. On the southwest (rear) corner is a small two bay porch with Doric columns and a simple balustrade.

### 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE (continued):

Barlow's widow Lavina occupied the house until 1917, when it was acquired by Seabury Smith Gould III, grandson of Seabury Smith and Hannah Botswick Hoskins Gould. Born in 1888, Gould studied at Cornell University and graduated from Hamilton College in 1911, then joined Goulds Pumps, where he rose to Vice-President. Active incivic affairs, Gould served as President and Trustee of the village at various times. He died in 1932 at the age of 34, and his widow, Ana Fulton Gould lived on in the house. Born in 1880 and from Washington, D.C., Mrs. Gould was closely associated with the founding and support of Eisenhower Collge, where a theater was named after her.

After Mrs. Gould's death in 1973, the First United Methodist Church (the adjacant property to the south) purchased the house and lot from her son's estate to expand their meeting and classroom facilities, and named it the Wesley House (after John Wesley Harding).

Warren H. Vreeland, a carpenter and joiner, is listed in the 1862-63 and 1874-75 village directories at what appears to be this address, so it is possible that he constructed the house.
Wallace Drew and his family occupied the house between 1885 and 1953. Drew was born in 1832 in Duxbury, Massachusetts, and was Vice President and Local Manager of Leason and Bailey Manufacturing Company. 
A prominent citizen and holder of many civic positions, at his death in 1927 all town businesses closed during the funeral service, in his honor.

maining portion of the rear of the building. The present porch was added prior to 1925. The main portion of the building then, according to the maps, is the same as it had been since at least  $18\overline{7}3$ .

However, the present owner of the building believes the house was constructed for E.W. Medden. According to village directories, Medden moved into the house sometime between 1910 and 1914, so that either the reconstruction or new construction of the building probably occurred between 1911 (the date of a Sanborn map which indicates the building of a more complex form) and 1914, when it is known that Medden lived there.

Medden was the son of Edwin and Sarah J. Medden. Edwin Medden (b. 1833 in London) had emigrated to the United States in 1859, and, as a mechanical engineer, found work as the superintendent of Silsby's Steam Fire Engine Department. E. William Medden was one of six children and was born in 1869. Like his siblings, he was well educated, and by 1888, was working as a bookkeeper at Gleason's Knitting Mills. By 1894, he had saved enough money to open a shop with Richard Page (Page and Medden). They sold New York tea, coffee, spices and crockery at 97 Fall Street. The business was short-lived, because by 1900 E. William was working as a bookkeeper again, and continued to live at his father's house on Clinton Street. Medden married late, about 1911, and he and his wife Rhena had the house at 74 State Street built or remodeled. By this time, Medden had become treasurer of the Goulds Manufacturing Company. He and his wife had two children, Edwin and Mary.

By 1934, Medden was treasurer and second vice-president of Goulds Pumps. He was also the president of the Seneca Falls Hospital, a trustee of the Seneca Falls Savings Bank, treasurer of the Seneca Falls Historical Society, and a member of Masonic Lodge #211. Medden died sometime between 1947 and 1954.

Dr. Skinner lived in the house sometime between 1947 and 1966. Skinner added a one-story section to the rear of his home for his medical practice. Dr. and Mrs. Robert Giugliano purchased the building from Skinner in 1972, but, according to village directories, lived in the building since at least 1966.

# 20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

At a meeting of the Board of Education on May 4, 1904, it was decided by unanimous vote to purchase the Miller property on State Street as the site for the new school building authorized by an act of the Legislature. The property included the entire west end of the Miller homestead lot and is 160 feet in width by 260 feet in depth, with a five foot right-of-way in perpetuity extending on the south line of the remaining Miller lot through to Cayuga Street. The cost of the property was \$3,000. The right-of-way permitted pupils living on or east of Cayuga Street to enter the school yard premises from Cayuga Street, avoiding the danger of crossing the rail-road tracks.

The east, or rear, elevation is taller (a full three storeys in height) and has less ornamentation. The projecting foundation and belt courses are stopped at the first window openings. The second floor assembly room has only two one over one double hung sash windows on this elevation.

The north and south elevations are identical in appearance. The classrooms are marked by small single sash windows and the halls have tall one over one double hung sash windows. The stairhall contains double doors with transoms at grade level and double three over three double hung sash windows at the landing level. The basement sash at the east end of the building are three over three over three double hung sash and at the west end are three light sash. All of the openings have segmental arches with stone sills.

Interior: The basement is half a storey below grade at the north and south entrances and level with grade on the east. The basement is basically unfinished with exposed first floor joists at the ceiling level and brick walls. Toilet rooms have been constructed using concrete block walls and original openings in the brick walls have been filled in. The floor is a poured concrete slab; the height from the slab to the exposed joist ceiling is 8'9". The boiler uses a flue in the southeast chimney/ventilator. The northwest chimney/ventilator has been removed at the basement level and the mass above is supported by a beam at ceiling level.

The first floor consists of a central lobby/hallway with classrooms in the four corners. Some of the classrooms have been used as offices. Part of the lobby has been divided off by a temporary partition and used as a cafeteria. Between the classrooms along the north and south walls are stairways which extend from the basement to the attic. These stairways connect with entrances a half storey below the level of the first floor. Theoriginal ceiling height was 12'5", but a recently installed suspended ceiling has lowered the height to 11'0".

The second floor plan consists of a large assembly room which runs east-west. It was originally lighted by a large skylight. On either side of the assembly room, in each corner, is a classroom. Along the north and south walls, between the classrooms, are stairways. The assembly room ceiling height is 15'0" and the classroom ceiling height is 12'0".

to design the First Ward School. The building was begun in 1905 and completed in August, 1906, in time for the beginning of the school year.

Until 1954, the building housed kindergarten through sixth grade classes. In 1954, four years after the Central School District was consolidated, fifth and sixth grades were moved to the Clinton Street School. The First Ward School was used as an annex and cafeteria for the Mynderse Academy and its additions on North Park Street for a number of years. Until 1984, it housed administrative offices for the entire school system on its first floor. In 1985, the building was sold, through a public bid process, to the current owner.









James Emery, a blacksmith born in England, is listed in Directories as occupying the house until about 1900. LeRoy J. Emery passed on the property in 1907 to John and Mary E. Keefe, who gave it to Elizabeth A. Cutter the following year. Directories list Henry B. Cutter as resident from sometime after 1900 until 1921, when the house was passed on to Grace E. Guernsey. Guernsey's father, Olin P. Emens, a clerk and supervisor of Varick and prominent local politician, resided in the house for a period. 

By 1927, Mann was working for Goulds Pumps and living in a house on Pine Street. Mannhad been promoted to chief engineer at Goulds by 1934, and had moved into this house. By 1947, Mann was 3rd Vice President at Goulds and his wife had been elected to the village Board of Education. They had one daughter, H. Joyce Mann.

The Mann's lived in this house until 1980, when they sold it to Louis and Bridget Parete, and in the late-eighties to the present owners.

William Haney was born in 1819 in Ireland, and according to Child's 1894-95 <a href="Directory">Directory</a> also owned four acres of land on Cayuga Street with two houses on them. With his son, Albert P., he operated a coal company at 28 Clinton Street, William Haney and Son. The house remained in the Haney family until the 1940's, after which it was lived in by a series of occupants: H.E. Green, Howard F. Miller (who owned a meat market on Fall Street), and Kenneth and Lucille Cook. Mario Agnello purchased the house in 1981.

It is believed that the rear wooden portion of the house was at one time a barrel factory for the manufacture of steel barrel hoops. This may be the structure that appears at the rear of the property on the 1856 map which belonged to cooper John Carter, and perhaps the brick main portion of the house was added to the factory as a residence sometime between 1856 and 1873.



DeLancy Knight (1866-1951), son of Horace W. Knight. H. W. Knight & Son were manufacturers of metallic letters and operated out of Horace W.'s house at 92 State, across the street.

In 1902, Mrs. Knight sold the house to James D. and Ellen D. Pollard. James Devillo Pollard, born in 1840, was the fourth son of Henry Pollard, a pioneer of the village, whose family has been important to its history. James D. was the first secretary of the Seneca Falls Savings Bank, the original Partridge Bank with which he was closely associated all his life. A model citizen, he held many civic positions including town supervisor, village clerk and Grand High Priest of the Royal Arch Masons. He died November 7, 1902, the same year he purchased the house. His widow Ellen lived on in the house after him, and willed it to her daughter Alice E. Pollard in 1918. Directories show that Alice E. made the house into a two family and lived in it until c. 1929. It became a one family again in the 1970s. Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Lohr, the current owners, purchased the home in 1980.



Stephen Weatherlow, according to Child's 1894-95 Directory, was a notary public agent for the Mutual Life Insurance Co. of New York, a real estate dealer, pension and claim agent, with offices at 104 Fall. He owned 8 acres of land on Troy St. behind his house (Sanborn maps, including the 1955 update, show the property as one large lot between State and Troy, which remained so until lots on Troy were portioned off in the 1960's)

Weatherlow's first wife was Elmira Vreeland. His second wife was Catherine A. Mills, from Port Byron, Cayuga County, New York. She graduated from the Medical College of Boston University in 1880 and after practicing in South Carolina moved to Seneca Falls, married Stephen Weatherlow and established an office, first in the Knight Block, then in the house itself. She died in 1900, and Stephen remained in the house until the 1920's, then left it to Mary Campbell Weatherlow, his third wife, and Mary L. and Jane Weatherlow, children by his first marriage. Mary Campbell Weatherlow died c. 1952 and left the house to Ruth and Olive Johnson, of the Cowin-Johnson House on 81 State. The Johnson sisters converted it into four apartments; then the building was sold in 1977 to Duane Warrick of Royce and Rosenkrans Insurance. In the late-eighties, it was pold to the present owner.

In 1985, the present owners, Richard and Virginia Mac Connell, purchased the home from Coleman and Marilyn Connell.

Additional information on this house was recently obtained (1989) from the present owners, who report that:

A concrete stone, with the date the Knight and Sons Manufacturing began business, is still in the ground behind the present garage. This house also had the first flush toilets in Seneca Falls, one on each of two floors.

During the time Horace W. Knight owned the property, the home was a station on the underground railway, moving slaves to Canada. Horace Knight's brother, pastor of a local church, was very active in freeing slaves and presumably arranged for many to hide in his brother's home. This activity caused a split in the congregation, resulting in the formation of a new church by about one half the membership.

The hiding place for slaves was rediscovered in the 1960s. It was a completely enclosed room on the first floor under the back stairway, accessible only through a trap door in the basement. Most of the room was converted to a walk-in closet in the center hallway. A portion of the original room is still enclosed.

A local architect or draftsman may have designed the house, since there were some working in the village during the second half of the 19th century. For instance, a man called James Kibby was a practical draftsman, who did all kinds of scrolls and brackets, drawings, and also carvings "executed in the best styles of art", according to an advertisement in the Seneca Falls Reveille. (He designed Miss Ada Morris' home on Cayuga St.). This building is a good example of an Italianate residence, well preserved, and thus contributing to the architectural quality of the area.

HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: While no specific date can be determined for construction, this building is very typical of the simple Queen Anne examples found in many of the architectural pattern books circa 1870 and 1880. It does not appear on the 1873 Bird's Eye View Map but appears first on the Sanborn Map of 1886. Ownership of the building can be traced to the Algire family in the late 1800's. An 1894 business directory lists a James C. Algrire as owning this property, the "estate of his mother's". Algire is also listed as a "draftsman at Rumsey's". Rumsey and Co. manufactured pumps and fire apparatus at the time. While alterations did occur to the porch, the Sanborn Map of 1892 and 1896 show no alterations to the building. The house remained in the Algire family until 1914 when it was sold to Michael J. Rambar. The garage was constructed between 1925 and 1955 according to Sanborn Maps.

Those elements were removed probably in the 1920's, in order to turn it into a Colonial Revival house. The Tax assessment's construction date is 1900, but because of its original style, it probably dates from the 1870's. The first owner was Moses C. Gould, a dentist. In 1894 Charles Gould, a druggist was at this address. Maynard B. Jacoby, president of the Seneca County Trust Company and a member of this company's board of directors, owned the house from 1910 to 1918, when he moved to a residence on Cayuga St. From 1921 to 1963 the building was owned by William G. Allen. In 1963 W.T. Buschmann bought the house and sold it in 1968 to Albert Ossman. The present owners are John McCully and L. Johnson.



His grandfather first settled in Varick in 1833.

By 1888, Stephen Monroe had built his residence at 99 (now 103) State St. and was employed as a clerk for L.S. Hoskins at 72 Fall St. at the corner of Cayuga St.

The second floor is largely unaltered, with wooden double hung sash, wood clapboards, and cornerboards. However, on the first floor the ell has been infilled, a hipped roof added at the top of the first floor, the main entry recessed with modern Colonial style wood surrounds, major and minor pilasters, and four light sidelights, and large windows with multiple panes. This floor has been aluminum sided and has a stone foundation. A single story rear addition is flat roofed, runs the length of the main block, and has a cinder-block foundation.



Sometime in the 1860's, Coleman had begun a rather eclectic store. The 1867 directory lists him as follows: "Groceries, gent's furnishing, laundry, sewing machine agent, and agent for the Great American Tea Company" at 65 Fall St. This is corroborated in a memoir of the village published by the Seneca FAlls Historical Society, "C.C. Coleman whizzed through the town in quest of squirrel cages, melodeons, and old candlesticks to help out the sewing machine business."

By 1881, Coleman is listed as selling real estate, and living on East Bayard St. He is not listed in any subsequent directories.

He and his wife Eleanor were members of the Seneca Falls Presbyterian Church, and he was a founding member of Rescue Engine Company #3 in 1842.

Subsequent owners of the property have been Thomas C. Armitage, ARthur S. Coleman, and Thomas S. Coleman.


Although this house has lost the decorative work, such as ornate verge boards, characteristic of the Gothic Revival style, it is immediately recognizable as such due to its massing. It helps to preserve the scale and rhythm of the streetscape.

John Rogan bought the lot at 127 State Street from the Seneca Falls Cooperative Building Lot Association in July 1874. Rogan came to Seneca Falls sometime between 1850 and 1862. By 1862, he was working as a moulder at Cowing and Company. He served in the civil war as member of the Eighth Cavalry in 1865. He had acquired enough money by 1867 to open a grocery and liquor store on Bridge Street, in a neighborhood populate largely by working-class Irish immigrants.



The property at 127 State Street remained in the family until 1897, when the family sold it to James Seta. Seta transferred ownership of the property to this wife Maria, but when she died, she willed it back to him. He sold it in 1911 to Florence Tennant, who in turn, sold it to Cynthia L. Stevens. Stevens owned the house until 1915, when Mitchell and Flora Rambar bought it. Clarence C. Miller acquired the house in 1920, and sold it to Floy Miller four years later. George & Irene Merritt bought it from Miller in 1927 and lived there until 1944. Frederick Frances Von Epps bought the property that year, Frances Von Epps died in 1969, and her husband lived there until 1973 when he transferred the property to Douglas & Deborah DePvy. The DePvys lived there until 1979 when current owner, Daniel Carahe bought the house.





The house at 131 State Street was built somtime between 1916 and 1921. Frank and Mary Ryan bought the property in December 1921 from Frank's father, Patrick Ryan, the proprietor of the City Steam Laundry. Frank Ryan began his career as a molder in one of Seneca Falls' many factories about 1910. By 1914, he had been hired as a mailman by the Postal Service, a job he held for over 25 years. He and his wife Mary were long-time members of St. Patrick Roman Catholic Church, as were his parents Patrick & Elizabeth J. Ryan. After Frank Ryan retired from the Post Office (about 1940) he continued to work as a security guard. By 1954 he had retired. He died between 1961 & 1964. 

Cornelius Seaman Hood bought this property from Gilbert Wilcoxen in August 1878. He was the son of Cornelius (b. 1810) and Agnes McDonald Hood (b. 1808) and was born (1847) and raised in Seneca Falls. His father was a laborer, and a long-time, active member (and a deacon) in the Seneca Falls First Presbyterian Church. Cornelius S. was educated locally and went to work at 15 as a clerk in John S. Gay's general store. He learned accounting in that job, and in his early twenties found employment as an accountant and paymaster for Goulds Pumps. In 1880, he entered the retail coal business, but in the crisis of 1893, he sustained considerable losses. His solution was 50 mags with a larger coal company and to become a wholesaler. 





William Hills acquired the land at 2 Troup Street some time before 1886.(1) Hills had been born in Auburn, N.Y. in 1863. He did not move to Seneca Falls until the early 1880's, when he entered into business with his cousin W.A.S. Latham.(2) He and Latham traded ownership of this property twice; it was originally Latham's father's, Oliver.(3)
Lathem and Hills were lawyers, who also acted as insurance agents, money lenders, and notary publics.(4) In 1893, Hills and his wife Alice sold the property to S.A.S. Mormstead. He sold it in 1896 to James Dempsey, who immediately transferred it to Mary A. Dempsey. She owned it until 1905, when Charles Herbert hought it. Herbert sold it the same day to Herbert

Campbell of Auburn, who owned it until 1953. That year Arthur Baldassari bought it and then sold it to Garrett and Fay Snyder. The Snyders owned the house until 1972, when it was sold to Beatrice I. Abbott. In 1984. Abbott willed the house to its present owner Pearl F. Clark.





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

According to the owner's abstract, David Demarest purchased the lot No. 38, from Gilbert Wilcoxen in 1879. Thomas McKevitt bought the property from Demarest in 1888. Bernard McKevitt, brother of Thomas, acquired it in 1892. It is possible that the McKevitts, who were builders by trade,, built the house between 1888 and 1896. There is no evidence to confirm who actually built the house.


In 1896 Sarah Nugent and her sister, Mary Durnin, owned the property. In the 1895 Seneca Falls Directory, Mary is listed as the widow of Nicholas Durnin. Her occupation as a dressmaker was also listed.

John Clary, grandson of John Clary, a Seneca Falls policeman from 1897 to 1902, recalled his grandfather's description of the corner lots of Washington and East Bayard Streets. John's grandfather attended the Fourth Ward School, and he and his classmates played baseball at the corner, with homeplate at the intersecction, and the playing field north and east from there.

John, the younger, who was born and raised in the house at 67 East Bayard Street, moved his mother-in-law into 4 Washington Street in 1936. He was a student at the time, and worked for Sullivan's Wholesale Market. He bought the house in 1946. At the time, he worked for Rumsey Products.





This structure is very similar to the other residences on Washington St. It adds to the integrity and scale of the streetscape.

Charles McKevitt, a carpenter and joiner, purchased lot #9 of the "Mumford Property" from the estate of O.S. Latham for \$200 c. 1887. The house at 5 Washington St., originally owned by Bernard McKevitt, Charles' brother, is identical in design and scale to the house at 7 Washington.

Charles sold the property to Michael Galvin in 1894. The 1896 map of the Village of Seneca Falls shows lot #9 as the "Michael Galvin" property with a house on the lot. 

Alterations to the north and south facades include similar one-story gable-roofed single room wings, flush with the west facade, built between 1896 and 1905. The north wing is one bay wide and the south wing is two bays wide. On both facades, the windows have been partially boarded up. The south facade has had a window added above the one-room wing, and another window and a door added to the right of the wing. The door and window additions appear to have been converted from an earlier and larger opening in the masonry wall.

The east facade has had more fenestration changes: two windows, and possibly four, have been converted into doors. Doors and windows had been boarded up in June 1981 until work was begun in summer 1985 by the current owner.

- 17. from the road. The 1873 Bird's-Eye View of Seneca Falls shows the Fourth Ward School with much of its neighborhood undeveloped. The building predates many of the neighborhood structures and streets.
- 18. Windows throughout the original section are segmentally-arched with hoods made of brick. The original building has a limestone foundation and watertable. The flanking one-room additions have limestone foundations, but concrete watertables. Roof details include wide entablatures and projecting eaves without brackets. Surmounting the hipped roof is a wooden cupola. The main entrance, with its original wooden hood above the double leaf door, remain intact. Renovation to four apartments was completed after the 1985 purchase by Chaplin.

Some of the original interior details remain intact. These include oak hardwood floors throughout, lath and plaster walls, and stamped metal ceilings. 20. story brick Italianate building was completed and opened to students in 1869. The one-room additions were made sometime between 1896 and 1905. According to Mrs. Kirk, a neighborhood resident who attended the school, the one-room additions were the boys' and girls' bathrooms. Mrs. Kirk described the interior of the building as having four large rooms, two on each floor. The first and second grades and the third and fourth grades were on the first floor. The fifth and sixth grades and the seventh and eighth grades were on the second floor. The Fourth Ward School continued to be used as a neighborhood school until the last graduating class of 1933, when the Elizabeth Cady Stanton School opened that fall on Garden Street.

Five years later on March 11, 1938, the Reveille printed a front page article which read "Howard Warner to Convert Old Fourth Ward School into Apartments." The article mentions that the Fourth Ward School was sold to Howard R. Warner who planned to remodel the building into three modern -3-

apartments with adjoining garages. It is not clear where or if the "adjoining garages" were ever built; there is no sign on the property of any outbuilding. Mr. Warner, however, was responsible for building the concrete block garage on the front of the building in 1973.

Mrs. Kirk recalls the first few years after the Board of Education sold the school to Mr. Warner. She fondly reminisces of how Mr. Warner hosted square dances and ice-skating on the property for the neighbors. To make the ice, Mr. Warner would flood the backyard with water and let it freeze. The 1947 Seneca Falls Directory lists the 8 Washington address as the Warner Electric Shop with three apartments. Joan Fogg, executor to Howard Warner's estate, states that the Fourth Ward School was used as apartments as recently as 1978. She added that her uncle, Howard Warner, lived alone in the building from 1979 until his death June 15, 1981.

Partly due to Mr. Warner's reputation and largely due to his neglect in routine maintenance of the structure, Mr. Warner received several notices from the city threatening the demise of the building. Despite the negative association Mr. Warner and the building have in the neighborhood due to the lack of maintenance, the Fourth Ward School remains an important historic landmark to those who can recall playing in the schoolyard and returning each day for classes.

The Trust for Public Lands acquired the building in 1983 with the intention 21. Seneca Falls Reveille: of finding an appropriate use for the vacant and deteriorating structure. In 1985, the building was sold to Mark L. Chaplin, who restored the August 7, 1868 exterior and renovated the interior to create



Charles McKevitt had been born in 1860, and was probably the son of James McKevitt, an Irish immigrant. Charles McKevitt married his wife Anna (b. 1874), who was much younger, at a rather late age. They had two children: James (b. 1904) and Alice.(4) Mc Kevitt lived in his father's house as late as 1888, but by 1894, had moved to a house on Washington Street which was probably built by his brother Bernard.(5) Soon thereafter, he finished reconstruction of the Hoay Hotel, which was destroyed in the great fire of 1890, and took over as live-in proprietor.(6) By 1905, he and his new family were living at 16 Washington Street, and the other four houses were generating rental income.(7)

McKevitts only known social activity was his membership in and generous donations to the Seneca Falls Roman Catholic Church.(8)

The house remained in the McKevitt family until 1967, when Alice J. McKevitt sold the property to the current owners, Salvatore and Frank Nicastro.(9)



The east gable end was removed forming a hip ridge. A 1 story shed roof addition was built on the Rear (E) and Side (S) facades. Non-operable shutters, on the second floor, a side door and porch, and a small slider window were added on the side (S) facade.

Charles McKevitt had been born in 1860, and was probably the son of James McKevitt, an Irish immigrant. Charles McKevitt married his wife Anna (b. 1874), who was much younger, at a rather late age. They had two children: James (b. 1904) and Alice.(4) Mc Kevitt lived in his father's house as late as 1888, but by 1894, had moved to a house on Washington Street which was probably built by his brother Bernard.(5) Soon thereafter, he finished reconstruction of the Hoay Hotel, which was destroyed in the great fire of 1890, and took over as live-in proprietor.(6) By 1905, he and his new family were living at 16 Washington Street, and the other four houses were generating rental income.(7)

McKevitts only known social activity was his membership in and generous donations to the Seneca Falls Roman Catholic Church.(8)

The house remained in the McKevitt family until 1967, when Alice J. McKevitt sold it to Kenneth Judd.(9) Subsequently, Judd sold the property to owners, Peter and Shirley Porcelli.(10)

his personal worth at 4500.00, though he owned no property in the village in 1851.

Roberts sold the house to James Crosby in April 1860, and apparently left town, as no other trace of him appears in the historical record. James Crosby, an illiterate Irish immigrant laborer transferred the property to Martin O'Neill in December 1895. In 1898 O'Neill sold the property to Mary A. Dempsey, who lived there until 1905, when she sold it to Charles W. Herbert. Herbert lived there until he died in 1953, and the property was given to Herbert Campbell, in accordance with Charles Herbert's will. Herbert Campbell immediately sold it to Arthur Baldassari, who lived across the street. Baldassari sold it three months later (July 1953) to Garrett and Fay Snyder.







Abby Gomor (Gay) bought this property from Anne Donegan in May 1865. She had been born in New York State in 1820, and worked in Seneca Falls as a house-keeper for Richard E. Gay, one of the town's wealthiest citizens.

She was described in a recollection of the village as,"A few shades darker than sunburn and with more true love in her heart than a hundred valentines could express". Richard Gay must have had an equally high opinion of her, because when he died in 1877, he left her \$1000.00 and all her bedroom furniture and personal belongings. Little other information about her exists, except in the following recollection about early black residents of the village: "I can see Abby clearly in my mind's eye as she walked down the street to market of a summer day, attired in bright print dress, white apron and neckerchief, 21. and a gay turban around her head. She always carried a large willow basket and it was filled with provisions as she returned up the street. She was stout and squarely built and,...never seemed to change in general appearance. In the winter she wore a red woolen hood trimmed with swansdown, instead of the turban, when she went to town or church. Abby was an ardent Episcopalian and attended services at old Trinity Church on Bayard Street. Mr. Gay died in the 1870's and then Abby lived alone somewhere in the village. She herself died in the 1880's and left quite a little property."

Subsequent owners of the property have been: Mary A. Herbert, Charles Herbert, Herbert's heirs, Regina A. Souhan, Theodore and Barbara Cobb, Harvey and Temma Boss, Gregory and Cynthia Babcock, and Murli and Nancy Sinha.

Patrick Reagan bought this lot from John Rumsey in March 1864. At the time of the purchase, he was already living on Washington St., but not in this house. The house appears on the 1871 map, so Reagan must have built it sometime between 1864-71.

Reagan was an Irish immigrant, who had been born in 1834 in Ireland, and had come to the United States in 1851. His wife Margaret (b. 1834) was Irish and had come to the U.S. in 1850. Reagan fought in the Civil War as a member of the 15th Engineers, and when he returned to Seneca Falls, found work as a laborer. The Reagans were members of the R.C. Church in Seneca Falls.



20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: Mary C. Newman bought this property from Caroline Partridge Cook in June 1899. Mrs. Cook a widow, owned a great deal of property in this neighborhood, which she and her husband had purchased from JP Cowing in 1882.
It is clear that the Newman family was living in this house on Washington St. as early as 1881. Since the house does not appear on the 1871 or 1873 maps, it was probably built sometime between 1873-81.
John Newman had been born in Ireland in 1840, and had come to the U.S. in 1860. His wife Mary (b. 1850) was also an Irish immigrant, having arrived in the U.S. in 1862. Their children, Frank (b. 1880) and George (b. 1885) lived with them.

The actual year of construction of the house at 32 Washington Street remains a
mystery. The property, because of its proximity to the source of water power on
the river, was owned by the Bayard Land Company in the early 19th century.
The book, The History of Seneca County, mentioned that Stephen Bayard owned a
grist mill on the lower falls. The "lower falls" refers to the falls near Seneca
and Washington Streets. The Bayard family operated a saw mill and the lumber for
the mill caretaker's house was cut at that saw mill. Located near the corner of
Seneca and Washington Streets, the caretaker's house was built in the 1830s.

ELIZABETH CADY STANTON HOUSE

32 WASHINGTON STREET

#17 The Elizabeth Cady Stanton House pre-dates many of the residential structures which surround it. Today it sits on a knoll from which Van Cleef Lake can be seen. Most of the historic Stanton lot has been acquired by the National Park Service and will be maintained as an historic landscape. The house is one of five buildings in Seneca Falls and Waterloo, New York which are included in the Women's Rights National Historical Park.

#18 wing.

When Elizabeth Cady Stanton acquired the house in 1847, she had extensive interior and exterior remodeling done, in the Greek Revival Style. A circular staircase and new moldings and mantels were installed, and a double parlor was created by opening a door in a partition wall in the two-story portion of the house.

Stanton sold the house in 1863, and it was used as a rental property until about 1900. In 1903-04, major renovations were made: the south wing was raised to two stories, the east wing removed and a new wing built, a new front porch was added, and new windows, doors, and chimneys were installed. Interior changes included moving partitions, installing electricity and plumbing and heat, and moving interior stairs. Further subsequent changes included: wood shingle siding added over clapboards, front porch enclosed in bungalow style, new bathrooms and exterior entrance to basement installed and new wall, ceiling and floor materials added.

The house was restored back to its c.1848 appearance from 1982-85. All post-1852 changes to the house were reversed.

420 younger sister, Elizabeth Cady, often came to visit her in Seneca Falls.

A deed search revealed the sale of property in 1842 from Edward Bayard to Daniel Cady of Johnston, New York. In 1842 Daniel Cady, Elizabeth's father, bought five acres of land with a house on Washington Street for \$2,500.00. This is the house that Elizabeth Cady Stanton moved into in the Spring of 1847. Elizabeth described the house in her autobiography, mentioning the condition of the building and grounds:

The house we were to occupy had been closed for some years and needed many repairs, and the grounds, comprising five acres, were overgrown with weeds. My father gave me a check and said, with a smile, "You believe in woman's capacity to do and dare; now go ahead and put your place in order." After a minute survey of the premises and consultation with one or two sons of Adam, I set the carpenters, painters, paperhangers, and gardeners at work, built a new kitchen and woodhouse, and in one month took possession.1

Elizabeth also mentioned in her book the neighborhood and the location of her house to the center of town. She wrote that her residence was on the outskirts of the town, that the roads were often muddy and that there were no sidewalks for most of the way. ELIZABETH CADY STANTON HOUSE

#20 Elizabeth and her husband lived in Seneca Falls for sixteen years. Henry B. Stanton, her husband, served as a Representative in the State Senate from Seneca County in 1850 and 1851. During Elizabeth's stay in Seenca Falls, she, along with four other women, organized the first Women's Rights Convention held at the Wesleyan Methodist Church in July of 1848. Elizabeth Cady Stanton was one of the most important political figures of the 19th century, because of her leadership of the early women's rights movement. The Stanton family moved to New York City in 1862.

The house, which was listed in Elizabeth's name and not that of her husband, was sold to John S. Edwards in 1862. The Seneca Falls Historical Society has the document which shows this transaction of property.

The Village Map of Seneca Falls in 1896 show the name of George Boardman as the owner of the house at 32 Washington Street. Hugh Gilmore, a teamster, acquired the property at the turn of the century. "Grip's" shows a photo of Hugh Gilmore as an Assistant Foreman of the Fire Department in 1904. Mr. Pagano lived in the house from 1942 until 1945 when S.H. Burroughs bought the house. Burroughs was the owner responsible for the wood shingles on the building. Burroughs lived at 32 Washington until 1977. Then Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Peters were the property owners. Ralph Peters and his wife, Marjorie, were returning from a trip to Boston and Mrs. Peters wanted to stop in Seneca Falls and see the Stanton House. At that time the property was for sale. Mrs. Peters convinced her husband to acquire the house. The Peters bought the house in 1978 but continued to live in Seattle, Washington. Lucille Povero of Seneca Falls served as caretaker for the building for the Peters.

Through donations from various organizations and friends, the house was purchased by the Elizabeth Cady Stantion Foundation from Ralph Peters in April of 1982. The building was then donated by the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Foundation to the National Park Service. The Park Service restored the house and opened it to the public in 1985.

Due to increased vehicular traffic and a reduction in the usable size of its site, partially due to the nearby construction of the Seneca Falls Hospital, the bandstand was used infrequently. Although renovated by the village in 1976 at a cost of \$15,000, it had again fallen into disrepair. A decision was made by the village to move the structure to People's Park to increase its visibility, and usefulness Therefore, in June of 1984, the Charles Kelsey Construction Company dismantled the building, moving only the roof intact SOURCES: (continued)




